EXAMINATIONS FOR THE VISUALLY CHALLENGED.

Examinations for the visually challenged are available. Requests for such examinations must be received in writing by February 1 for all except the Colleague Examination and the Service Playing Certificate Test. For the Colleague, the deadline is August 1, 2016, for the November 2016 examination; January 1, 2017, for the May 2017 examination; and August 1, 2017, for the November 2017 examination. For the Service laying Certificate Test, the application may be submitted between August 1, 2016, and January 1, 2017. Persons with other challenges may also arrange for accommodations. In all cases, contact the program

administrator before the above dates. Anonymity of all candidates and examiners remains inviolate. Every candidate must meet the same AGO standard of performance at each exam level in order to receive a certificate.

With this paragraph:

DISABILITIES ACCOMMODATIONS. The AGO aims to make the certification examinations inclusive of all qualified organists and conductors, regardless of disabilities. To that end, the AGO invites candidates with disabilities to submit requests for reasonable accommodations using our standard REQUEST FOR REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS form. All requests shall be handled in strict confidentiality. To ensure proper time for consideration, forms shall be submitted to the program administrator at least 60 days prior to your scheduled testing date.

The latest financials, from January 31, 2017, report that we are ahead of budget by \$60,154. Many of our expenses will come in later in the fiscal year, however, e.g. POEs.

In reality, we are way below budget expectations for income, particularly the Annual Fund. James and I have been working on a revised budget, due to two specific overly-optimistic lines. We plan to have a revised version for approval at the April meeting.

We are also beginning to work on the budget for next year. I have compiled a four-year history of actual returns so we can understand the realities and trend lines. All too often income has been "padded" to make the budget balance. Our goal is to present real numbers. Please submit estimates for the next fiscal year (September 1-August 31). If you would like to see your area's "real numbers," I can send them to you.

In the meantime, I ask that each of you be as economical as possible. Please review your own budget lines carefully and trim expenses wherever possible for the remainder of this fiscal year. Whenever possible, please use WebEx for meetings.

CDS Project

Tony has had the CDS brochure printed, and these will go in the mail soon. Please do your part – join the CDS and be a model for the entire AGO. We want to show that the entire National Council has joined. You do not need to leave huge sums, but please designate something (my suggestion is 1% of an account) as your bequest. I believe strongly that this is the way to put the AGO in good financial standing as our membership declines.

V. Update on FTC developments—James Thomashower

We are still waiting for the FTC to countersign the documents. Claudia Higgins and James have been working on a replacement document for hiring and compensation of organists. We are going ahead with meeting our monthly reporting requirements in good faith in advance of the countersigned agreement.

VI. Old business.

David reported that there will be a face-to-face meeting next week for the Committee on Career Development and Support and representatives from several other committees to discuss what we can do to support our members especially those who are in crisis.

VII. New business.

Our next meeting will take place in Princeton at the Joan Lippincott Gala April 21-22. The meeting will proceed as usual, with the exception of private interviews of NC members by Elizabeth Bailey and Nancy Schmidt of 2b Communications.

Director's Report on the Task Force on Denominational Music Organizations April 2017

To the National Council of the American Guild of Organists,

Recent activity of the task force has been to contact the DMOs regarding the Event Calendar, to make sure they list their summer conferences. This is such a valuable tool for centralizing conference information, both to advertise and to avoid scheduling conflicts. The hope is that we can find a way to make this calendar more visible. The DMOs were also contacted regarding the deadline for the listing of summer events for the April TAO.

While emailing the DMOs about the above information, they were reminded that they are encouraged to share events, conferences, projects, new leadership appointments, etc. through articles submitted to the TAO. ALCM submitted for the February issue and FUMMWA for the April issue. LPM will have an article on their summer and fall course offerings in the May issue and FUMMWA will have a review of their convocation in the October TAO.

The task force has been in conversation with Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria regarding hosting of our conference. The current dates being considered are September 24-26 or October 1-3. VTS has much to offer so we hope this works out. They are not too far from Reagan National Airport, so flying in would not be difficult. We would be meeting on a seminary campus which speaks to our mission in church work and Rev. Dr. William Bradley Roberts, faculty member, would be pleased to be a part of our work. We will be able to use classroom space both for larger plenary sessions as well as smaller rooms for breakout sessions. We could join their community for Morning or Evening Prayer in their lovely new chapel with a beautiful new Taylor & Boody. Housing, as well as meals, are located right on campus. The headquarters for NPM are nearby in Silver Spring and a few task force members live nearby, reducing our transportation and housing expenses. The main item to be worked out, after date and location, is whether we could obtain funding for housing and meals, so our guests only have to cover their travel.

Report of the Vice President/Councilor for Competitions and New Music Dr. Eileen J. Hunt, AAGO 28 March, 2017

1. Competitions Committee

The preliminary round for NCOI was completed on 15 March, 2017. The judges were David Hurd, Joel Martinson and Sue Mitchell Wallace. The semifinalists, in alphabetical order, are: Skye Hart (Scottsdale, AZ), Robert Horton (Lancaster, PA), Juan Andres Mesa (Holliston, MA), Douglas Murray (Nashville, TN) and Kalle Tovio (NYC). The semifinals will take place in July at the Montreal Organ Festival.

The rules for the 2018 NYACOP competition appeared in the March, 2017 issue of TAO.

The 2017 cycle of RCYO chapter competitions will conclude on 15 April.

2. New Music Committee

The 2017 Marilyn Mason and E. C. Schirmer commissions are scheduled for performances this summer.

The Pogorzelski-Yankee Commission Competition (fourth year) announcement will appear in the May 2017 TAO; applications are due this summer and the winner of the commission will be announced in the fall. This composition will receive its premiere in 2019.

Composer Christopher La Rosa is at work on his P-Y commission, which will be premiered in 2018.

Christopher Adler's composition **Constructs** was premiered at Indiana University of Pennsylvania on 26 March, 2017 by organist Ann Labounsky. It was my honor and privilege to attend this marvelous event and I look forward to sharing a detailed discussion with you next month.

Student Commissioning Project awaits confirmation of funding for next year. New Music Committee plans an article in TAO highlighting a couple of successful pairs of organist/composer who have participated in this worthwhile project.

3. Meeting on 21 March

It was my distinct honor and pleasure to participate in the ground breaking meeting including representatives from Committee on Career Development, Committee on Membership Development, Marketing Committee, present and past Chaplains, Councilor David Lamb and James Thomashower. We will be eager to share a synopsis of this most remarkable and wonderful meeting.

Report of the Secretary

April 2017

Our AGO Facebook group has grown to over 2,250 members who continue to post most of the content on this group. Our Facebook page has over 7,850 followers. These numbers continue to increase but at a slower pace than we have experienced over the past few years.

My committee reports follow:

Marketing Committee

For the past several months the Marketing Committee has been working in conjunction with COMDACS on a joint project to help chapters assess their overall health and provide them with tools to become stronger. It is called the "Chapter Dashboard" project. It is two part where each chapter will be asked to complete a survey of the various components of chapter life; this will have a numeric value computed in Excel and produce a report for Marketing and COMDACS on the back end of the health of that chapter. The followup will be from COMDACS with a "Toolbox" to help the chapter address and deficiencies highlighted in the Dashboard report. We plan to partner with the Great Lakes Region to roll this out in a pilot project fashion before taking it to all regions. While timelines are not yet locked in, we plan to pilot next Fall and have full roll-out next January. One of the key components, we feel, is the strong interaction by the District Conveners in assisting the RCs in chapters participating in the first place, but then with the tools from the toolbox. We also feel that the project will strengthen the leadership triangle from RCs to DCs to Chapters.

We have also been approached by Don Cook to assist in Marketing some new educational videos and are excited to partner with him in that project. Finally, we are partnering with a large group assisting the Professional Concerns Committee in revising documents that are now in conflict with the FTC settlement and re-creating value in membership in that area of the guild portfolio.

- 2. FINANCIALS, MARCH 31, 2017 (Note: This report was written when I only had the February 28 financials. I will update any major changes when I receive the April finances before our meeting.) Halfway through our fiscal year, we appear to be ahead of budget. Operating revenue exceeds operating expenses by \$64,438. If you factor in the unrealized and realized gains on investments, we are ahead by \$214,434. We are under budget in both income and expenses. Although we are under budget in both income and expenses, the months ahead are the expensive ones, with POEs, etc. on the schedule. We have discovered some unrealistic budget lines, so James and I are in the process of preparing a revised budget that will present to F&D and then our May WebEx. We want to keep the budget in balance.
- **3. "CASH-POOR MONTHS"** Because the majority of our funding arrives with membership renewals, we face a cash crunch each spring. Bills must be paid, and we have to dip into our only available cash sources, which are the three unrestricted funds. As memberships arrive, we hope that these monies can be repaid.
- **4. BUDGET TIGHTENING** As you request money for your budget for 2017-2018, please refer to the four-year history that I have given to each of you. We have to ask you to be conservative ("curmudgeonly") in your requests as our membership declines. If at all possible, use WebEx instead of face-to-face meetings.
- **5. CURRENT AMOUNT AVAILABLE FOR STRATEGIC PLANNING AND HOW MUCH AS ALREADY BEEN PAID** I thought it would be wise to let the Council know that we have been dedicating \$1750 each month since September, 2015, toward Strategic Planning. The current amount is \$35,000, and we continue to set the monthly amount aside. Other funding is available from the Council Designated Fund. In the past two fiscal years the fund has earned about \$29,000 in dividend and interest

income, of which 80% is available for projects, or about \$23,200. Both the monthly investment of \$1750 and the income from the CDF will continue as we make our way through this project.

7. CLARENCE DICKINSON SOCIETY PROJECT Tony Thurman and I have launched our project to contact the AGO Special Members to ask them to remember the AGO in their estate plans. Report of the National Councillor for Education

Submitted by Don Cook April 4, 2017

CPC [Committee on Professional Certification, Jonathan Hall, Director]

Discussions are going forward about adding to the repertoire of exams offered by the Guild. Nothing will be done whatsoever to weaken the current examinations or compromise the Guild's appropriately high standards. Rather, easier exams, geared towards youth and/or towards single skill areas, are being discussed. A few prototypes are coming along, and topic areas are being identified. For example, as Don Cook's course on organ registration, developed for his university, goes online as a Guild resource, it makes excellent sense to develop a registration exam. This exam and an attractive certificate (even available as PDF chapter resource) would "crown" the course of study.

These simpler and single-area exams would not bring privileges of attribution or academic dress, but would be celebrated as milestones of personal progress. As the Guild moves more heavily into the promotion of education as a core benefit, a more comprehensive curricular model becomes more appropriate.

We envision local chapters taking responsibility for administering and judging these exams. Discussions have mentioned local "ownership" and empowerment.

In this endeavor, the director is working closely with the Councillor for Education and the director of the Committee on the New Organist.

Exam dates and repertoire are being finalized for 2018, with the July 2017 TAO firmly in mind.

The new Examination Hymn Booklet is awaiting production for the next cycle; permissions have been garnered and we only need to compile and make available.

A new accommodations policy, replacing and enhancing the former "accommodations for visually-impaired candidates," will be used for the first time in the coming year as well. This policy, reflecting best practices for accommodation and inclusion, was drafted on our behalf by Mari Franklin, Esq., a Barrington, Illinois attorney specializing in special-needs student advocacy. Ms. Franklin is also an active member, and elder, in the Presbyterian Church of Barrington and is a lifelong supporter of the pipe organ and its music.

The exams will be graded in NYC this year on June 12 and 13.

One committee member is rotating off after three terms—Andrew Scanlon—and Don Cook and I have communicated re a successor. In addition, I have requested replacing a committee member after one term, and have also discussed a successor for that individual. The new CAGO study guide is available, and a companion DVD is still in preparation.

A new exam center has been established in Tampa, Florida, obviating the need for Florida candidates to travel to Atlanta. Thanks to the dean, Michael Hunter, and the new coordinator, Jonathan Hehn.

Preparations are underway for workshops on certification in Kansas City. I hope a reception will once again be possible for certificated members.

The national staff continues its tradition of excellent and cordial support, for which this committee is deeply grateful.

CoPOE [Committee on Pipe Organ Encounters, Nicole Marane, Director]

We have accepted the applications for five POEs for the following chapters in 2018:

- POE: Central Florida (SOUTHEAST), Philadelphia (MID-ATLANTIC), Twin Cities (NORTH CENTRAL), and Los Angeles (WEST)
- POE+: Phoenix (WEST)

We are still waiting for possible applications from:

- POE from Albany, NY or Boston, MA from NORTHEAST
- POE+ from Rockford, IL GREAT LAKES
- no POEs in SOUTHWEST at this time planned

We have discussed dates within CoPOE and will be communicating these with the directors in the next few days. For now it looks like two POEs will be in late June, and two in July. So at least there are not 2 conflicting POEs. The Florida POE needs to be in June. The other June POE we will try to move to an open week in July.

We do not have any POEA, or POE-TECH planned for 2018. This is OK because POE-Tech seems to work well every other year, and POEA need a year off anyway to reevaluate.

FUTURE

It was decided for site applications in the future to be received by March 1st not Feb 1st. We would like the RC to encourage the prospects from their region (and if none, help us find some!) starting September 1st, so that there isn't the mad scramble AFTER the due date, that we had this year and last year. CoPOE can also help encourage around September 1st if they have contact details from RC.

I would still love for RC to be thinking ahead every three years for possible chapters to host and to update this document:

Scholarship applications will automatically go to the director as well as CoPOE. They will be reviewed monthly, but scholarship amounts will not be awarded until all applications are in (April 15). They will still be first in first served, but it will help us with questions about other scholarships received if they are done all at the same time.

Nicole Marane

Director, Committee on Pipe Organ Encounters

CONO [Committee on the New Organist, Brian Mathias, Director]

Since last report, the Committee on the New Organist has been focusing its efforts on developing a "plan of action" for the coming year. Our current goal is to complete a few of our initial projects by early summer, and then make a big media push in the fall to introduce these resources to the members of the guild. This would hopefully include a series of TAO articles, website and social media announcements, and some sort of letter that could be distributed to chapter deans and other leadership. Our hope is that through these efforts, AGO members will become attuned to the need for educational offerings to take a place of greater prominence in the coming years as we try to grow our membership by welcoming early-level organists.

Among the projects slated for summer completion are the following:

- Develop an online channel for engaging new organists with members of CONO
 (or possibly others interested in assisting), providing a forum where they can ask
 questions and receive answers and also connect with other entry-level organists.
 This would most likely take the form of a Facebook page, though other
 possibilities may exist.
- Refine, expand, and update the information presented on The New Organist webpage at agohq.org.
- Provide chapters with direction on welcoming and nurturing new organists (this will be distributed in coordination with David Lamb and Barbara Adler).
- CPC has been exploring the possibility of a series of new early-level exams. Jonathan Hall and I have discussed the possibility of making some announcement of these exams (or even just of their forthcoming availability) in coordination with this fall campaign, since these exams would fit into the narrative perfectly. To my knowledge, CPC has not yet made a firm commitment on this, given that development of these exams will take significant time and effort.

There is one area in which we are in need of assistance and/or ideas. Isabelle Demers made an attempt last fall to solicit responses from chapter deans in order to compile a national list of organ teachers, with the hope that this list could be made available on the website. However, response rates from chapter deans have been very low, making the list incomplete and much less useful than would be desired. If the national council has any thoughts about how we might better accomplish this goal, we would welcome input and suggestions.

This issue is somewhat difficult, in that we must strike the balance between availability of information and safety. Our reason for trying to obtain this information through chapter deans was that this would serve as a form of vetting so that those teachers on the list for each chapter are people known by the chapter leadership. We could solicit responses from the entire guild, but there are obvious safety concerns in creating a directory where anyone can put their own name forth. Once again, input from the national council on this issue would be appreciated, particularly if there are any legal issues that need to be considered.

Clearly, there is much work to be done. However, CONO is optimistic about the possibilities before us, and the new "life" that could come to the AGO with an influx of early-level organists once we have a better set of offerings in place.

Report of the Councillor for Conventions

While I'm sorry not to be in Princeton for the Gala and to meet with National Council, my sabbatical time is going splendidly and I'm having a wonderful time studying. I'm currently doing 5 hours of Intensive Spanish classes each day and loving it! I have been gone from the States since a month after our meetings in Salt Lake City, so this report is constituted from things I've monitored from Europe.

All of our 2017 Regional Convention coordinators and their committees are working very hard and with only a few months left before convention time some are stressed about the current state of registrations. This is normal at this point and we see very often that people wait well past the Early Registration cutoff and even into the final days before a convention to register, so we're confident that most of the stress being felt currently will abate in the coming weeks/months.

Here is a synopsis of notes from each 2017 Regional Convention Coordinators.

Mark Baumann - North Central Region - River Valley Chapter

132 people are currently registered for the North Central convention. We planned for 125 and are on the way to set a record.

All members of the team are working diligently. We are excited about everything - newly composed music, bringing people to the new School of Music at The University of Iowa and the new Klais instrument (both 2016), restored, refurbished and relocated instruments and exciting workshops. Michael Barone will be present and some events will be recorded. We have asked Michael and we hope that he will make a Pipedreams program about the convention. We are most excited about the great response for the first convention to be hosted by the River Valley chapter.

We have a small concern in that the end of our convention overlaps with the beginning of another one in our hotel, and there are not enough rooms in our block to accommodate our estimated numbers. I have been working with Andy Anastasi at Conference Direct and with my team to find solutions to the situation, and we're confident we'll have a resolution to this problem very soon.

Adam Zagotti - Great Lakes Region - Youngstown Chapter

Youngstown has 88 registered as of March 29th. We have secured pledges totaling \$31,000 in concert underwriting, but we still need \$16,000 in donations to make everyone sleep better at night.

We are most excited to announce that we have secured a concert with the entire string section of Apollo's Fire: the Cleveland Baroque Orchestra! This is one of the world's

foremost leading early music ensembles. Our closing concert with James David Christie and the Youngstown Scoring Stage Orchestra will be stunning as well. While we are nervous about falling so far behind the other conventions in terms of registrations, we are confident that Great Lakes will, as usual, offer a successful and enjoyable convention.

Alex Oldroyd - West Region - Salt Lake City Chapter

I think things are progressing well with registration. We have a good deal of people coming from outside the region. Our local chapter has been slow to register, but we're blitzing everybody with email ahead of our early registration deadline (which we'll probably extend through the weekend). At the moment, it looks like we have 135 registered for the convention (a few of these are comps, but most are paying registrants from outside Salt Lake City). 94 have picked up the transportation package. (See update below)

I'd like to see more under-30 registrants take advantage of our \$99 offer. We're working with a few people on getting the word out more to the AGOYO crowd.

As we mentioned before, I think our biggest challenge is fundraising after our fundraising person left the committee. We're working on it, and I think we'll still come out okay.

People are really excited about our convention; I was in NYC a couple weeks ago, and even some of the AGO connected people I spoke with there were talking about it. It's going to be exciting to welcome them all here. I think our program has shaped up to be really phenomenal, and while I'm excited for all of it, I think Richard Elliott's performance of the Guilmant 2nd Symphony and Stephen Tharp's concert are sure to be highlights.

By far, today was our biggest day yet, \$11,373 just today!

Email went out again today announcing extension of early rates to April 4 (Tuesday) at noon MT. Everything will automatically switch over at that point.

Our hotel pickup has increased as well.

Thomas Leslie - Northeast Region - Montreal

Things are full-steam-ahead in Montreal.

We have just over 400 paid registrants to date, and almost 600 total attendees including artists and other comps. The split is about 60/40 AGO/RCCO, which is more-or-less what we had been expecting given the membership numbers of each organization. My hope is to entice another 200 paid registrants to come – which is ambitious but doable, in my view, based on the strength of our programming, and the fact that Montreal is a destination city. Members of the committee will be reaching out directly to their networks in the coming weeks to encourage people to register, and we will send reminders to the RCCO and AGO NE Region membership as well.

We have 35 students/young organists who have applied for funding to attend the festival, and we have confirmed sponsorships for 10 thus far. We are working with several AGO Chapters and RCCO Centres, plus a couple of private foundations in order to fund the remaining 25 applicants. These numbers are not yet included in the paid attendees list. Michael (Bedford) reminded me of the success of the young organists cocktail in Houston, and we will are planning a similar event early in the week in Montreal.

Prior to the early-bird registration deadline, we ran short of hotel rooms. We were able to increase our hotel block by 49% (from 1120 room nights to 1664) based on the pace of room pickup, and are currently sitting at 89% of the new block. Our obligation to the hotel is a cumulative 80% pickup, so we are in very good shape.

Once we hit 95% occupancy, we will have Andy Anastasi talk to the hotel about a further increase. We do not want to expose ourselves to unnecessary risk, but do not want to deter people from attending because the hotel block is full. If the Sheraton is unable to offer any additional rooms at an attractive rate, we also have the option of taking a small block at the Fairmont for \$219 per night.

Our initial contract rate was \$175 CAD per night. This rate was not available additional rooms on some of the dates in our block, and the daily rates currently vary from \$175 to \$239 per night. The \$175 rate is still available for the main Festival dates (July 2-6) and the higher rates are the Friday and Saturday nights before and after the Festival, which effect mainly the pre- and post-convention days. The open market rate for those dates is well over \$300, so our higher rate is still very good.

I know that Michael Bedford will be attending the Convention and the RCCO National President and our conventions chair will be here too. Perhaps it would be good to organize a meeting to talk about this collaboration and how we could collaborate further in the future.

Our committee is great! We have 18 people from Toronto, Montreal, Boston, Vermont, the SE Mass. Chapter, and Yale. Everyone has been working hard on their individual files, and this, combined with the administrative team in my office, has made for a wonderful support mechanism for what we hope to be a wonderful event.

I don't think I could possibly pick an artist or event as the most exciting aspect of the week. There will be excitement every single day – something for everyone. Cherry Rhodes, Nathan Laube, Olivier Latry, Roomful of Teeth, King's College (London), Katelyn Emerson, Christian Lane, Renée Louprette, Jean-Baptiste Robin, Rachel Laurin, the list goes on and on!

We are getting excited, and look forward to playing host for our American friends and colleagues.

Peter DeWitt - Southeast Region - Jacksonville Chapter

We are gradually creeping forward with 108 of our necessary 150 registrants. Budget has improved in some areas but facing setbacks in others. We are trying some new approaches in that area. We have surprisingly lost one rare presenter, but hope to cover that slot with another. The programs are offering a significant variety well-suited to venues in the historic First Coast.

Rene Schmidt - Southwest Region - Dallas Chapter

As of today (April 1, 2017), we have 167 registered. All contracts (9) for the recitalists, performing choirs or ensembles have been issued and returned. All contracts for the venues have been issued and returned and all workshops presenters (28) have also been issued contracts and had them returned.

Our opening worship service will be a recreation of the 17th-century Lutheran Vespers Service using "original" instruments. We were fortunate to get a grant from Mrs. John Bradford to underwrite the entire Vespers Service (over \$7,000). Jeremy Wirth, our grant and gifts person, has been working hard on getting funding for the convention. To date, we have received \$72,585. in gifts and grants. That amount includes a \$20,000 grant from the Dallas Chapter which we hope to repay.

At our closing banquet, we will feature humorist Pat Crenshaw, who performed at our last regional convention in Dallas as well as the 1994 National AGO Convention in Dallas. (Yes, she is a legend in Dallas and just as funny as always!)

The convention will conclude with a concert by Chanticleer at the Cathedral of Guadalupe in the heart of the Arts District in Dallas. The Cathedral has some of the best acoustics in Dallas and we will be selling tickets to the general public.

We had a volunteer day last Monday in Dallas as part of our AGO meeting, soliciting volunteers and drumming up support.

Kenna Payne - Mid-Atlantic Region - Richmond Chapter

The Mid-Atlantic Convention in Richmond, VA, has seen a push of registrations in the last week of 'early' registration rates, resulting in almost 70% of our total hoped-for attendee count. We've encountered one problem with Cvent's registration structure, but seems to have affected only a handful of registrations so we've resolved them on a case-by-case basis. We're in the last stages of advertising sales, have sold 11 booths from vendors, and are within 1 or 2 events of meeting the full sponsorship budget. Monthly email blasts to the region's members (since September 2016) and new emails from me to the Chapter Deans (1 sent, 2 still to send) have been our best promotional decisions. All topics have been covered in these emails. Remaining details now receiving focus include signage, final menus, program book, social media presence before and during the convention, TV and radio interviews, and recruiting and coordinating volunteers.

Committee for Conventions Work of the Committee for Conventions has included monitoring the above-mentioned Regional Conventions, encouraging, giving advice, and supporting in any way possible the Coordinators and their teams.

The project of rewriting the National Convention Guidelines continued for 2 days in Houston in my absence. Ray Cornils stepped in to chair those meetings and did an excellent job. To give you an idea of the scope of the work that this Committee does and how it goes about its work, I include the following synopsis of those two days of work.

As you can see the project has not yet been completed and our work is ongoing. We will meet again in the Fall to try to finish up this much needed revision of the National Convention Guidelines.

Lynn Bratney - 2018

We had an SC meeting yesterday (April 1) and things are moving along very nicely, I believe. As always though, cash flow at this point is a never-ending conversation. We're constantly looking for cash at this point as bigger expenses will be coming soon, i.e., second payment for New Music compositions in May/June timeframe and the beginning development of the website which requires half payment up front to both the graphic designer and the website builder. However, we still don't have an established cash flow of money into the bank that will cover these expenses. The major portion of the fundraising will begin later this year as the foundations and corporations we will be going to fund 2018 projects mostly in 2018. We have money coming in from 2018 Club

payments and donations and a few other things. We're also talking to the bank about a line of credit, so we're trying to fill in the blanks.

Contracts for performers and Worship are going out at this time. Workshops are still getting their final list put together and will begin sending contracts out soon. Facility contracts are also going out at this time.

We continue to modify the schedule to handle new situations as they come up. July 4 has probably been changed the most with the Annual Meeting now following the BBQ which is then followed by the theater organ concert in the same theater downtown. We've also added a optional trip that may be labeled as a workshop to the Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, KS after the arts worship service on Friday afternoon. This is a brand new sanctuary for this church (just opened today!) which is the largest Methodist church in the US and which has an incredible stained glass window above the altar that is not to be missed. It currently has a large Rodgers organ in it and we will have a small concert there. It is unbelievable how good this organ sounds in this space. Eventually, they will have a pipe organ, but it is not there yet. This will be a good opportunity for anyone who wants to hear the possibilities of a digital organ in a large space.

We're getting people lined up and registered for all the regional conventions. We will have representatives at every convention.

We're still trying to find good parking options for those who may want to drive to Kansas City. We feel that with it being so close to the center of the country that driving is an option for many people. We need somewhere for people to park those cars that isn't going to cost and arm and a leg.

We have a wonderful Transportation Chair and he continues to negotiate with the bus company. However, this will be an expensive bus city due to the large area that the city covers. We're working to bring it down as much as possible.

Scott Atchison - Atlanta 2020 I received news from Scott Atchison, Co-Coordinator of the 2020 National Convention in Atlanta that his Co-Coordinator, John Brandt, will probably have to step down from his Convention duties due to his responsibilities in a new job. While this word is not yet official, it is probable. Scott will approach the Atlanta Executive Committee to see how they want to proceed.

Scott reports that all Steering Committee positions have been filled except for a Gifts and Grants Chair.

Seattle - 2022 Wyatt Smith, Samuel Libra, Norma Aamodt-Nelson, James Thomashower, and Andy Anastasi had a site visit to three hotels in Seattle on March 6, seeing the Westin, Sheraton and a Hyatt under construction.

The Sheraton and Hyatt are both still in the running, and Andy is negotiating with both while we wait for Seattle to name a Housing Chair. The Westin is out because they can't or won't offer us enough rooms for our group.

San Francisco - 2024 Matthew Burt reports this great news from the San Francisco Chapter:

I wanted to let you know that I attended the San Francisco Chapter board meeting last night, and there was unanimous support for exploring a 2024 convention. Their proposed next step is to announce to the chapter membership that they're considering it, and to ask for any suggestions/feedback/offers of support. (This is what they did ahead of hosting the regional in 2011.) But basically, it's a go if the Committee for Conventions would like it to be.

A call will still go out in TAO for bids for 2024 to ensure that anyone who wants to consider hosting a National Convention that year has a chance to make a proposal, but the CFC is definitely heartened by the San Francisco Chapter's enthusiasm and we have encouraged them to continue working toward presenting a formal bid.

Philadelphia - 2026 Philadelphia has for several years now expressed interest in hosting the National Convention in 2026, even though no formal bid has yet been made. I have recently received an email from them expressing some concern that with all of the 250th birthday celebrations of the country going on that summer there might be difficulty in obtaining hotel rooms at a competitive rate. I have asked them to contact Andy Anastasi immediately to start the process of discovery and to determine whether or not it will actually be feasible for them to host a National Convention that summer. They also inquired as to whether 2024 were already taken and implied that if it weren't, they might make a bid for that instead.

I hope all National Council members will be going to at least one Regional Convention this summer. Please let me know as soon as possible which one you will attend. We will want to make sure you are visible and have the opportunity to address the convention attendees briefly during the Regional meeting.

Spring 2017 Report to National Council

2017 JANUARY JUBILEE REPORTS

Northern Illinois January Jubilee (Great Lakes Region) was held at Emmanuel Episcopal Church, LaGrange, IL on January 28, 2017. The event was sponsored by Fox Valley and Southwest Suburban Chapters of the AGO. The JJ directors were Sharon Fisher (Dean, Southwest Suburban AGO), Betsy Waldon (Dean, Fox Valley AGO) and Karl Bruhn (Great Lakes Regional Councillor). There were 102 in attendance and 4 complimentary memberships were awarded.

Highlights from Karl Bruhn: The "AGO Festival Choir" of 30 singers presented two anthems and led in the congregational singing during the opening worship service. The keynote speaker was Rev. Dr. Paul Detterman, senior pastor of First Presbyterian Church of River Forest. The event included ten workshops offered simultaneously. Most of the workshops were presented by chapter members. Participants from *six different states* were present. The 3M Rodgers Infinity 361 digital organ was used in four sessions and the 1970 3M – 63 rank Casavant was used in two workshops. Steve Wente presented the closing organ concert on the Rodgers digital instrument.

Tallahassee January Jubilee (Southeast Region) was held at First Presbyterian Church and First Baptist Church Tallahassee, FL on February 3-4, 2017. The Jubilee directors were Joseph Kraus (Dean, Tallahassee AGO), Charlotte Kroeker (Church Music Institute, Dallas, TX). There were 35 in attendance and 6 complimentary memberships were awarded. The churches offered two organs for the event: Two-manual Taylor and Boody mechanical action (First Presbyterian) and a four-manual Rodgers digital (First Baptist).

Brief comments from Joseph Kraus: "The conference was quite successful, and offered a wide range of differing workshops to suit organ and choral interests. Of particular note were the plenary panels led by clergy and musicians that explored working relationships as well as seasonal planning for worship. The Friday evening Hymn Festival conducted by John Neely was well done and well attended; a number of the conference participants sang in the festival choir."

Wichita January Jubilee (North Central Region) was held at First Presbyterian Church, Wichita, KS on January 28, 2017. The Jubilee director was Christopher Shaw, Organist at Plymouth Congregational Church, Wichita, KS. There were 66 in attendance and 40 complimentary memberships were awarded. The event closed with an organ recital by Dr. Elisa Bickers, Principal Organist at Village Presbyterian Church, Prairie Village, KS.

Christopher Shaw shares this about the Wichita Jubilee: "The morning began with a keynote address by Dr. David Pickering. It was great to have 2/3 of our attendees being non-members. National support was so appreciated! Our workshop titles were very creative: What Do All These Knobs Do and What Do I Do with My Feet?; Tried, True, New: A Choral Reading Session; One Year of Service Music in 60 Minutes; and "Handbells 101," to name a few. I would highly recommend the Jubilee program and encourage other chapters to host a Jubilee event!"

Northeast Region Spring 2017 quarterly report 3.31.17

Conventions

Montreal, June 30 to July 7, Sheraton Montreal

The committee met in Montreal in February in Montreal. Our registration is going very well and is still steady after the end of early registration. We increased our room block by 49% and that new room block is now 87% full (Montreal Sheraton). When we get to the high 90s we will likely have to increase the block again. We are keeping the Fairmont in the loop in case we need to get a block of rooms there – a couple blocks down the street.

We programmed ambitiously hoping that great programming would draw attendees. RCCO convention budgets are not viewed as money-making vehicles for the organization. We modified this strategy – we wanted to give the full value to the members attending and still hope to make some profit. The strong programming, along with the city, has drawn many to the convention, but we also hope to turn a tidy profit. We are at about 600 three months out – we think we can reasonably expect another 200.

This committee of various individuals spread out over the Northeast and Canada has been working very well together, and are eager to give of their time, energy, inspiration and resources. Thomas Leslie and the RCCO have been wonderful partners, as well as the CIOC staff.

Buffalo July 1-4, 2019 – The committee is preparing its budget and programming. They are a very competent group of people. I've enjoyed working with them. John Novak is a skilled leader and an excellent Convention Chair. My discussions with Karl Bruhn this week about the Youngstown convention have given me lots of ideas to start now to help this convention find what is exciting in Buffalo and learn how to integrate that into their marketing.

POEs

Hartford, July 23-28, 2017 – I spoke recently with the Dean who is excited about the preparations for the POE. I spoke with Vaughn Mauren, who is the coordinator. He was a bit concerned about low registration.

I've pursued many chapters about hosting a POE in 2018, Westchester, Syracuse, Rhode Island, Cape Cod, New Hampshire, Merrimack, Portland, Boston. The Boston chapter is

preparing an application for 2018. Cape Cod is thinking of doing a POE+ perhaps in '19, Syracuse also for '19 or '20. Westchester is also considering, but I would like to sway them to host the '21 regional.

Quimby

Allesandro Pittorino won the NYC competition and Jiaqi Shao won the Buffalo competition. The Bridgeport chapter had one competitor and chose not to award a 1st place prize.

The Boston chapter has had some problems which Eileen Hunt and I have been trying understand. We and Regional Competition Coordinator will meet to discuss recommendations for future competitions. Their competition is scheduled for April 8th.

AGOYO – The Northeast AGOYO board has been inactive. Some board members are not happy with this inactivity. Students have priorities, sometimes their degree work has to come first. I will be looking to refresh the board for the coming year.

Members and Chapters

I met with the Cape Cod board under acting leadership until the next election. David Martin is doing a wonderful job. Maury Castro is also on the board and has had a wonderful influence.

I've fielded myriad calls and emails about the FTC ruling. Most members are still relatively clueless about what it will mean for them. Some chapter leaders are complying, but Deans still need help picking up this cause.

I worked with the Boston and Brooklyn chapters to revise their Operating Procedures.

I attended chapter events in Boston, Rhode Island and consulted with a Bridgeport leader.

Report from the Mid-Atlantic Regional Councillor

Work continues on the final steps toward the Regional Convention in Richmond. Initial preparations to organize the dual-chapter South Jersey Convention in 2019, while lagging behind schedule, are picking up steam.

An appeal I sent to chapters asking for support for the Winchester POE and the Richmond Convention was met with generous responses. I was pleased to receive an application for a POE to be held in Philadelphia in summer 2018.

Three out of five of my District Conveners responded to a request from me for a report of activity from their chapters. Their perception, and mine, is that chapters are continuing to operate in good form offering outstanding programs, opportunities for social interaction, and personal care for their members.

There is a reaction to the current FTC activity which is generally one of perplexity – "Why bother with organists?" While this does not reflect a sense of angst, it is clear to me that there was sufficient backlash from our well-meaning era of Professional Development when we attempted to elevate our professional image and influence in our workplace. The hard feelings resulting from such initiatives as the Grievance Procedures and "bench fee" protections generated enough resentment as to get the attention of the federal agency who then determined it was necessary to slap us down and give us a black eye for good measure. There are expressions of disappointment that salary guides are forbidden as they were actually found to be useful and generally non-controversial. Time will tell if the self-image or the public image of the AGO is affected one way or the other. I am certain, however, that our membership and its leadership are honorable and decent and do not deserve the severe reprimand being handed down and spread abroad. I am also certain that we will continue to behave and serve honorably fulfilling our calling and love for the organ.

The Regional Report on the Great Lakes States for the AGO National Council by Karl Bruhn, Great Lakes R.C. First Quarter 2017

Things remain busy in our Great Lakes Region—which is good!

At the beginning of this quarter we hosted one event that took a lot of planning. But our "January Jubilee" held on Saturday January 28, 2017 turned out o be highly successful with 104 paid admissions. (We were very pleased with the turn out.) It was at the historic (and beautiful) Emmanuel Episcopal Church in La Grange, IL. (This was the second January Jubilee in our Region. Last year's JJ was hosted by the Southern Indiana Chapter.) The host church has a wonderful 3M Casavant organ; and a Rodgers digital organ was brought in—to add balance to the workshops, plus mini-recitals and demonstrations. The Rodgers digital organ was used five times. The Fox Valley and the Southwest Suburban (Joliet area) chapters co-sponsored this event. (Color brochures were mailed out early to virtually every church within 40 miles of the host church.) Our keynote speaker was the Rev. Dr. Paul Detterman, the new pastor at First Presbyterian Church in River Forest. Paul has graduate degrees in both organ and theology, so was a perfect person to lead a workshop on musician/clergy affairs in addition to being our keynote speaker. Included in the day were ten workshops on various topics related to church music. Each workshop was lead by a regional expert in his/her aspect of church music. (Dr. Steven Wente of Concordia University (River Forest), played the day's ending organ concert.) Also, included was a catered lunch with time for conversations and networking; and a "music store" which sold actual copies of the music that was discussed at the various workshops and lots of other pieces/collections. Local publishers, whose music was presented, included GIA, Hope Publishing, World Music Library, MorningStar, and CPH. Intentionally, the cost (for folks attending) was kept low—only \$20. (I am very pleased to report that we have a host chapter lined up for next year's January Jubilee—Lexington, KY,)

The Youngstown (Ohio) Chapter has had a very busy first quarter with getting ready/finalizing the details for their 2017 Regional Convention. This event will take place from July 3-5. (As a pre-convention event RYCO practices and competition will occur from June 30-July 2.) The convention will feature some terrific organs in and around Youngstown including a large E. M. Skinner (at Stambaugh Auditorium), a large Schlicker (at St. John's Episcopal Church), a large Casavant (at St. Columba Cathedral), a large Moeller (at Trinity United Methodist), and others. (I am fortunate in that I have played and/or heard all of these amazing instruments.) Local players from our Region at this Regional Convention will include Janette Fishell, Craig Cramer, Todd Wilson, Nathan Laube, Rhonda Sider-Edgington, David Jonies, James David Christie and others. Adam Zagotti, the convention Coordinator, and his steering committee have been hard at work preparing for and publicizing this upcoming Convention. They have found wonderful—and affordable (!) housing for those who will be attending. I am very pleased with their work. About three weeks ago I drove to Youngstown (450 miles each way) and attended their steering committee (and chapter) meeting.

Locations for our (spring 2017) RCYO/Quimby Competitions were: Columbus, Cleveland, Grand Rapids, Indianapolis, and Chicago. We always look forward to hearing excited and inspired young artists. Either Yun Kim (our region's competitions' coordinator) or I try to be in attendance at each of these competitions. I attended the Indianapolis competition this past Saturday. The winners of these various competitions will complete this summer in Youngstown.

This past quarter/year we have done something new: We have gone out of our way to promote our RYCO/Quimby players—from the "Race to Indy" 2015 Regional Convention. Many of "our" players have since had a chance to play at several of our region's chapter meetings. The finalists and winner for our Quimby Regional were: Garret Law, Matt Bickett, Grant Wareham, Joshua Ridenour, and Madeleine Woodworth—who was the winner. Also, Madeleine competed in the National Competition in Houston this past summer, and sadly did not win.

Speaking of conventions, our 2019 Regional Convention for will be hosted by the Grand Rapids, Michigan chapter. Plans are underway, and I have met with their chapter leaders. Their planning committee is already sending me copies of the minutes of their meetings. Grand Rapids has a splendid collection of organs, and hosted the Regional in 2005—so they are experienced at this, and are looking forward to hosting this event.

I am still in the process of finding a chapter (or chapters) who will host our 2021 Regional Convention, but think I am getting close to finalizing this.

Also, I am trying to get the chapters with out-of-date web sites "on board."

Our Region has its AGOYO (Virtual) Chapter, and has a fine slate of officers who have been active in their tasks. The officers are: Carolyn Craig, Dean; and Matthew Buller, Katie, Burk, Mitch Miller, Stephen Smith, and David von Behren. I had a chance to meet with these leaders in one of their virtual meetings so far. All three of the original officers, Katie Burk, Kipp Cortez and Carolyn Craig were in attendance at the Houston National Convention. (I took them all out to dinner, and learned lots from them—from their point of view.)

I am sad to report that no chapter in our region "came forward" and was willing to host a POE for 2017. (But our Region hosted two POE's in our region in 2016. Lexington hosted a regular POE; and Cincinnati hosted a POEA). I am working on getting a chapter to host one in 2018—and have two chapters who are interested in hosting a POE+ in 2018.

About a dozen chapters in our region will be hosting a "Pedals, Pipes, and Pizzas" this year. Those are excellent programs for exposing young/new players to our instrument.

This master copy lists all the events happening in each state—arranged by quarters (e.g. January-March 2017). Brooks Grantier, the Michigan District Convener, started this. The other DC's have followed. Lots of new and terrific events are happening in our region.

RE: AGO Compliance Obligations Timeline

As you know, on March 31, 2017, the Federal Trade Commission voted to accept the Agreement Containing Consent Order we signed on March 31, 2017, and placed it on the public record for comment. This memorandum provides information about the AGO's obligations along with a checklist timeline for what needs to be done to comply with the Order.

Please be careful to refer to the Order itself for actual requirements rather than relying on the shorthand descriptions here. Citations to the actual paragraphs in the Order are found throughout.

Procedures and Timing for the Issuance of an Order: The Agreement and Order will remain on the public record for 30 days to provide time for comments. If any comments are received from the public, the FTC staff will draft responses and the Commissioners will consider whether the Order should be adjusted. Modifications are almost never made at this stage, and we would be consulted before the Commission made any modifications.

After the public comment period, the Commission will vote on whether to issue the Complaint and the Decision and Order. We should estimate that the FTC's Order will be issued sometime in early May, at the earliest. The dates in this memorandum assume that the order is issued (or 'made final') by the Commission on May 8, 2017. We will need to adjust our timeline based on the actual date of the Order's issuance to take into account any time slippage.

The Order's Overall Injunctive Requirements: First and foremost, the Order requires that the AGO, its leadership and its chapters (collectively "the AGO") must take no actions that restrict competition between its members. This includes specifically that the AGO will do nothing to limit its members from (i) competing for one another's positions of employment, (ii) restricting the terms under which members provide their services or (iii) identifying norms terms for which a visiting or substitute organist or choral director will provide services in the place of

employment of another member. The AGO is also forbidden from publishing or recommending model contract provisions or compensation guidelines or fees for organists or choral directors. These are found in Paragraph II of the Order.

If the AGO is found to have violated the Order (including the provisions noted above and those outlined below), it could face monetary penalties. We will all work together to protect the organization from this possibility, but it is important to know that the FTC can seek a court's order involving civil fines.

Ongoing Obligations: Following the above admonitions, the order includes a number of specific requirements. Several obligations run for the upcoming five years while others run for the full 20 years that the Order is operative. These are:

- 1. **For the first five years of the Order**, the AGO is required to provide information about the FTC settlement to its members and chapters and to conduct training about the settlement and antitrust in general. Specifically, from May 8, 2017 May 8, 2022 (dates to be adjusted), the AGO must
 - Provide a copy of the FTC Settlement Statement (i) with any renewal notice to a member; (ii) to any new member within 30 days of joining the AGO; and (iii) to any newly accepted chapter within 30 days of its acceptance see Section III.D.
 - Provide annual training to the AGO's Leaders and employees concerning obligations of the FTC Order and antitrust law requirements related to the AGO see Section IV.C.
 - At each National or Regional meeting, provide an in-person presentation that summarizes the FTC Order obligations and gives general antitrust advice and distribute an antitrust compliance guide to chapters with the same information see Section IV.E.1. and 2.
 - Post and maintain antitrust compliance information on the AGO website, along with link to FTC website press release see Section III.A.1. of Order. (Note that this requirement extends from July 8, 2017 through July 8, 2022 (dates to be adjusted)).
- 2. **For the duration of the order, which is 20 years**, the AGO will be required to implement an antitrust compliance program with policies to ensure the organization is abiding by its obligations under the Order and the antitrust laws. Specifically, from May 8, 2017 May 8, 2037 (dates to be adjusted), the AGO must –

- Terminate any chapter within 120 days of learning that it has violated the FTC Order, which termination must extend for 1 year see Section III.E.2.
- Implement policies to enable questions to be asked and violations reported related to the FTC Order and antitrust laws generally, including providing for discipline of those who fail to fully comply with the Order see Section IV.D.
- Provide FTC information 30 days prior to any dissolution or merger or other similar structural change involving the AGO – see Section VI.A., B. and C.
- Maintain records that the FTC may inspect to demonstrate its efforts to comply with the FTC Order, and maintain complaints received about failure to comply see Section III.G.1 and 2.
- Allow FTC access to records related to enforcement of FTC Order see Section VII.A. and B.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Federal Trade Commission, having initiated an investigation of certain acts and practices of the American Guild of Organists ("Respondent" or "AGO") and Respondent having been furnished thereafter with a copy of a draft complaint that the Bureau of Competition proposed to present to the Commission for its consideration and which, if issued by the Commission, would charge Respondent with violations of Section 5 of the Federal Trade Commission Act, as amended, 15 U.S.C. § 45; and

Respondent, its attorneys, and counsel for the Commission having thereafter executed an agreement containing a consent order, an admission by Respondent of all the jurisdictional facts set forth in the aforesaid draft of complaint, a statement that the signing of said agreement is for settlement purposes only and does not constitute an admission by Respondent that the law has been violated as alleged in such complaint, or that the facts as alleged in such complaint, other than jurisdictional facts, are true, and waivers and other provisions as required by the Commission's Rules; and

The Commission having thereafter considered the matter and having determined that it had reason to believe that Respondent has violated the said Acts, and that a complaint should issue stating its charges in that respect, and having accepted the executed consent agreement and placed such agreement on the public record for a period of thirty (30) days for the receipt and consideration of public comments, now in further conformity with the procedure described in § 2.34 of its Rules, the Commission hereby issues its complaint, makes the following jurisdictional findings and enters the following order ("Order"):

1. Respondent American Guild of Organists is a non-profit corporation organized, existing, and doing business under, and by virtue of, the laws of the State of New York, with its office and principal place of business located at 475 Riverside Drive, Suite 1260, New York, NY 10115.

2. The Federal Trade Commission has jurisdiction of the subject matter of this proceeding and of the Respondent and the proceeding is in the public interest.

ORDER

T.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that, as used in this Order, the following definitions shall apply:

- A. "Respondent" or "AGO" means the American Guild of Organists, its directors, boards, officers, employees, Leaders, agents, representatives, councils, committees, foundations, divisions, Chapters, successors, and assigns.
- B. "Antitrust Compliance Officer" means a person appointed under Paragraph IV.A. of this Order.
- C. "Antitrust Counsel" means a lawyer admitted to practice law in one or more of the judicial districts of the courts of the United States.
- D. "Antitrust Laws" means the Federal Trade Commission Act, as amended, 15 U.S.C. § 41 *et. seq.*, the Sherman Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1 *et. seq.*, and the Clayton Act, 15 U.S.C. § 12 *et. seq.*
- E. "Certification" means the document attached to this Order as Appendix B.
- F. "Chapter" means any regional or district association of organists that is recognized by the AGO as a chapter.
- G. "Code of Ethics" means a statement setting forth the principles, values, standards, or rules of behavior that guide the conduct of an organization and its members.
- H. "FTC Settlement Statement" means the statement attached to this Order as Appendix A.
- I. "Leaders" means the AGO's National Council, National and Regional Officers, Councillors, Conveners, and Chapter Deans.
- J. "Member" means a member of the AGO, including but not limited to, voting members, non-voting members, general members, independent members, certificated members, national subscribing members, national honorary members, Chapter members, and any other classes or sub-classes of members.

- K. "Notification Date" means the date on which Respondent makes the notification required by Paragraph III.A.3. of this Order.
- L. "Organization Documents" means any documents relating to the governance, management, or direction of the relevant organization, including, but not limited to, bylaws, operating procedures, Chapter Management Handbooks, Chapter Operating Procedures, Codes of Ethics, Codes of Professional Standards, grievance procedures, compensation guides or fee schedules, model contract provisions, policy statements, interpretations, commentaries, guidelines, and brochures.
- M. "Regulating" means (1) adopting, maintaining, recommending, or encouraging that Members follow any rule, regulation, interpretation, ethical ruling, policy, commentary, or guideline; (2) taking or threatening to take formal or informal disciplinary action; or (3) conducting formal or informal investigations or inquiries.

II.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent, directly or indirectly, or through any corporate or other device, in or in connection with Respondent's activities as a professional association in or affecting commerce, as "commerce" is defined in Section 4 of the Federal Trade Commission Act, 15 U.S.C. § 44, do forthwith cease and desist from:

- A. Prohibiting, restricting, regulating, impeding, declaring unethical, interfering with, or advising against any form of price competition for the provision of services provided by Members;
- B. Regulating, restricting, restraining, impeding, declaring unethical or unprofessional or interfering with, by any means, the efforts of any Member to seek or accept a position or engagement to provide services of an organist or choral conductor;
- C. Regulating, restricting, restraining, impeding, declaring unethical or unprofessional or interfering with, by any means, the efforts of any Member to provide services of an organist or choral conductor, including, but not limited to, encouraging, urging, or requiring that Members obtain the approval of an incumbent organist or choral conductor before accepting an engagement to provide services of an organist or choral conductor for a wedding, funeral, or any other engagement requested by a third party;
- D. Creating, issuing, formulating, compiling, distributing, publishing, recommending, suggesting, encouraging adherence to, endorsing, or authorizing any list, guide, or schedule of compensation or fees, standard approach, or model contract, for Members to use when determining or securing compensation for their services, including but not limited to compensation or fee reports, guidelines, or suggested or recommended fees; and

E. Accepting as a Chapter, or maintaining a relationship with any Chapter, that the AGO knows engages in conduct prohibited by Paragraphs II.A., II.B., II.C., or II.D.

III.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that:

- A. No later than sixty (60) days from the date this Order is issued, Respondent shall:
 - 1. Post and maintain for five years on the Guild Document's page of the AGO's website, together with a link from Respondent's home or menu page that is entitled "Antitrust Compliance," the following items:
 - (a) An announcement that states "The AGO agreed to change its Code of Ethics, and will not adopt or encourage its Members to follow or enforce any Code of Ethics provision relating to limitations on competition by organists or choral conductors to provide services, including price competition, that does not comply with the FTC Decision and Order."
 - (b) The FTC Settlement Statement; and
 - (c) A link to the Federal Trade Commission's website that contains the press release issued by the Commission in this matter; and
 - 2. Distribute electronically or by other means a copy of the FTC Settlement Statement to its Leaders, Chapters, Members, and employees; and
 - 3. Notify each Chapter that, as a condition of continued recognition by the AGO, such Chapter must execute and return a Certification to Respondent no later than one hundred eighty (180) days from the date Respondent notifies such Chapter.
- B. No later than sixty (60) days from the date this Order is issued Respondent shall:
 - 1. Remove from the AGO's Organization Documents and the AGO's website any statement or document that is inconsistent with Paragraph II of this Order, and
 - 2. Publish on the AGO's website any revisions of the AGO's Organization Documents, the press release issued by the Commission in this matter, and the FTC Settlement Statement.
- C. Respondent shall publish, in the font that is customarily used for feature articles:

- 1. Any revisions of the AGO's Organization Documents, the press release issued by the Commission in this matter, and the FTC Settlement Statement in the next available edition of the "The American Organist" magazine; and
- 2. The FTC Settlement Statement in the edition of the "The American Organist" magazine, or any successor publication, on or as close as possible to the first and second anniversary dates of first publication of the FTC Settlement Statement.
- D. For a period of five (5) years after this Order is issued, distribute electronically or by other means, a copy of the FTC Settlement Statement to each:
 - 1. New Chapter no later than thirty (30) days after the date the organization becomes a Chapter;
 - 2. New Member no later than sixty (60) days after the date of commencement of the membership; and
 - 3. Member who receives a membership renewal notice at the time the Member receives such notice.

E. Respondent shall:

- 1. Immediately terminate the recognition of any Chapter that fails to provide an executed Certification no later than one hundred eighty (180) days from the Notification Date and shall not permit the terminated Chapter to claim itself as a Chapter of the American Guild of Organists until such time as the Chapter provides an executed Certification; and
- 2. Terminate for a period of one (1) year, no later than one hundred twenty (120) days after Respondent learns or obtains information that would lead a reasonable person to conclude that the Chapter has, following the date this Order is issued, engaged in any practice prohibited by Paragraphs II.A., II.B., II.C., or II.D of this Order; unless, prior to the expiration of the one hundred twenty (120) day period, said Chapter informs Respondent in a verified written statement that the Chapter has eliminated and will not reengage in such practice, and Respondent has no reasonable grounds to believe otherwise.
- F. Respondent shall include a copy of the FTC Settlement Statement, electronically or by other means, with the next dues statement sent to each Member after the date this Order is issued.
- G. Respondent shall maintain and make available to Commission staff for inspection and copying, upon reasonable notice, records adequate to describe in detail any:

- 1. Action against any Member or Chapter taken in connection with the activities covered by Paragraph II of this Order, including but not limited to enforcement, advisory opinions, advice or interpretations rendered; and
- 2. Complaint(s) received from any person relating to Respondent's failure to comply with this Order.

IV.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent shall design, maintain, and operate an antitrust compliance program to assure compliance with this Order and the Antitrust Laws:

- A. No later than thirty (30) days from the date this Order is issued, Respondent shall appoint and retain an Antitrust Compliance Officer for the duration of this Order to supervise Respondent's antitrust compliance program.
- B. For a period of three (3) years from the date this Order is issued, the Antitrust Compliance Officer shall be the Executive Director of Respondent after which a new Antitrust Compliance Officer may be appointed who shall be Antitrust Counsel, or a Leader of Respondent.
- C. For a period of five (5) years from the date this Order is issued, Respondent shall provide annual training to its Leaders and employees concerning Respondent's obligations under this Order and an overview of the Antitrust Laws as they apply to Respondent's activities, behavior, and conduct.
- D. Respondent shall implement policies and procedures to:
 - 1. Enable persons to ask questions about, and report violations of, this Order and the Antitrust Laws, confidentially and without fear of retaliation of any kind; and
 - 2. Discipline Leaders, Members, and employees for failure to comply fully with this Order.
- E. For a period of five (5) years from the date this Order is issued, Respondent shall:
 - 1. Conduct an in-person presentation at each National or Regional meeting of the AGO that summarizes Respondent's obligations under this Order and provides context-appropriate guidance on compliance with the Antitrust Laws; and
 - 2. Provide an antitrust compliance guide to Chapters to use at each meeting of such Chapters that summarizes Respondent's obligations under this Order and provides context-appropriate guidance on compliance with the Antitrust Laws.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent shall file a verified written report with the Commission setting forth in detail the manner and form in which it intends to comply, is complying, and has complied with this Order:

- A. No later than (i) ninety (90) days after the date this Order is issued, (ii) one hundred eighty (180) days after the date this Order is issued; and
- B. No later than one (1) year after the date this Order is issued and annually thereafter for four (4) years on the anniversary of the date on which this Order is issued, and at such other times as the Commission staff may request.

VI.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent shall notify the Commission at least thirty (30) days prior to any proposed:

- A. Dissolution of Respondent;
- B. Acquisition, merger, or consolidation of Respondent; or
- C. Any other change in Respondent, including, but not limited to, assignment and the creation or dissolution of subsidiaries, if such change might affect compliance obligations arising out of this Order.

VII.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, for the purpose of determining or securing compliance with this Order, and subject to any legally recognized privilege, and upon written request and upon five (5) days' notice to Respondent, Respondent shall, without restraint or interference, permit any duly authorized representative of the Commission:

- A. Access, during business office hours of the Respondent and in the presence of counsel, to all facilities, and access to inspect and copy all books, ledgers, accounts, correspondence, memoranda and all other records and documents in the possession, or under the control, of the Respondent related to compliance with this Order, which copying services shall be provided by the Respondent at its expense; and
- B. To interview officers, directors, Members, Leaders, or employees of the Respondent, who may have counsel present, regarding such matters.

VIII.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that this Order shall date it is issued.	l terminate twenty (20) years from the

Appendix A

FTC Settlement Statement

Dear Member:

As you may know, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has conducted an investigation concerning certain provisions in the American Guild of Organists (AGO) Code of Ethics and other documents. The investigation focused on:

- A Code of Ethics provision that prohibits members from applying for a position held by someone else unless there has been a public announcement of a vacancy for that position;
- A Code of Ethics provision that requires a member engaged for a wedding, funeral, or other service to (1) obtain the approval of the incumbent musician before accepting, and (2) tell the party requesting the service to pay the incumbent his/her customary fee; and
- The AGO's publication of (1) lists and schedules of compensation and fees for its members to use, (2) standard methods and formulas for Chapters to provide to members for calculating compensation and fees, and (3) other model contract provisions.

The FTC has alleged that these practices violate the Federal Trade Commission Act because they unnecessarily restrict members of the AGO from competing with one another, restrict price competition, and deprive consumers of the benefit of competition.

To end the investigation expeditiously and to avoid disruption to its core functions, the AGO has voluntarily agreed to a Consent Agreement and entry of a final Decision and Order by the FTC. In doing so, however, the AGO has not admitted any law violation.

In general, the FTC's Order prohibits the AGO from:

- maintaining bylaws, a code of ethics, operational policies, or membership
 requirements that restrict its members from competing with one another for
 positions or for engagements for weddings, funerals, or other services, or
 competing in any other way, including on price;
- interfering with members' efforts to provide services and to compete on price;

• publishing documents such as fee schedules and model contracts for members to use when determining or securing compensation for their services.

The Order also requires the AGO to establish an antitrust compliance program.

The AGO is in the process of revising its Code of Ethics and other documents and publications to comply fully with these requirements and is implementing a robust antitrust compliance program to ensure its leaders, members and Chapters do so as well.

In addition, some of the AGO Chapters currently have operational documents that contain provisions similar to those prohibited by the FTC's Order. The Order requires that the AGO may not accept or maintain a relationship with a Chapter that does not abide by the Order's provisions. Each Chapter will therefore need to review its code of ethics, operational policies and procedures, membership requirements, and documents relating to fees, compensation, or model contracts, and remove all prohibited provisions. Each Chapter will need to certify to the AGO that it has done so before a deadline set in the Order or the AGO will remove it as a Chapter.

Appendix B

Certification

Name of Chapter recognized by the American Guild of Organists

As a condition of being affiliated with the American Guild of Organists (AGO), the chapter named above (Chapter) makes the following representations to the AGO:

- 1. <u>No Restrictions On Competing For Positions Or Engagement</u>: As of the date this Certification is executed, the Chapter does not maintain in its rules, regulations, code of ethics, policies, procedures, newsletters or website any type of rule, interpretation, ethical ruling, guideline or recommendation that would restrict, restrain, impede, declare unethical or unprofessional, or interfere with or advise against a member of the Chapter from competing for positions or engagements. Examples of the types of provisions that restrict competition include any of the following:
 - Restricting a member from seeking or appearing to seek for the member, a student, or a colleague, a position occupied by another person.
 - Restricting members seeking or appearing to seek a position for the member, a student, or a colleague from doing so without official and public declaration and announcement of a vacancy.
 - Restricting members from accepting engagements to provide services as an organist or choral director unless they obtain approval of an incumbent.
- 2. <u>No Restrictions On Competing On Price-Related Terms</u>: As of the date this Certification is executed, the Chapter does not maintain in its rules, regulations, code of ethics, policies, procedures, newsletters or website any type of rule, interpretation, ethical ruling, guideline or recommendation which would restrict, restrain, impede, declare unethical or unprofessional, or interfere with or advise against a member of the Guild from competing on price-related terms. Examples of the types of provisions that restrict competing on price-related terms include any of the following:
 - Restricting price competition by members or encouraging members to restrict price competition.

- Restricting members' compensation or fee arrangements or communications with third parties, or advising members what to communicate with each other or to third parties about compensation or fees, including compensation or fees for special services such as weddings or funerals.
- Adopting, publishing, or advising about compensation, fee lists, schedules, guidelines, or standard approaches to determining compensation or fees.
- Publishing a model contract or model contract provisions for members to use when determining compensation for their services.

Executive Director's Report to the National Council

April 2017

FTC Investigation:

On Friday, March 31, without notifying AGO National Headquarters, the National Council, or our legal counsel, the FTC posted on its website and distributed to the public a press release announcing that it had entered into a proposed settlement agreement with the AGO. Read the release read here: https://www.ftc.gov/news-events/press-releases/2017/03/american-guild-organists-agrees-eliminate-rules-restrict

Unfortunately the release contained a few misleading statements which might have been corrected had the FTC followed its normal protocols. Our legal counsel advises me that she plans to speak to the acting director of the Bureau of Competitions to express her concern about this missed step.

Following the late afternoon distribution of the release on March 31, I participated in a meeting with several elected and appointed Guild leaders as well as our legal counsel at which time I agreed to draft a letter to the membership updating everyone on this situation. With excellent suggestions and input from all participants on the call, this letter was finalized on Tuesday, April 4, and emailed to the membership. The letter was also posted to our website here: https://www.agohq.org/federal-trade-commission-and-ago-settlement/. The letter generated several dozen replies from the membership expressing various emotions from gratitude for the work done by the AGO leadership to deep disappointment at the AGO's failure to fight the bureaucracy. Overall, however, the most common reaction was dismay that the FTC would spend its time investigating the AGO rather than major corporations or other more important matters.

With the issuance of the press release, the clock began running on a 30-day period during which the Commission will accept comments from the public. We anticipate that we will receive word from the FTC in mid-May that they have concluded their review of the public's comments and have finalized the consent order. Thereafter there are various compliance steps we must follow over the next 60 days. Other compliance requirements must be completed over 5- and 20-year periods.

Answering inquiries about the FTC matter from our membership and working with legal counsel on this topic has been extraordinarily time-consuming, but the time has been well spent as the government appreciates our cooperation.

On March 20-21, I met in David Lamb's home in Clarksville, Ind., with AGO committee and pastoral leaders representing many different aspects of the Guild's work. Our focus was to assist the Committee on Career Development and Support in its efforts to provide new resources to Guild members in light of the FTC settlement. Special thanks to David for hosting us at Crimson Hall and making all arrangements for local travel and meals.

Strategic Planning: The Strategic Planning Task Force narrowed its potential lists of consultants to two, and I participated in the meeting of the Task Force in Irving, Texas.at which those consultants were interviewed. We chose 2B Communications, promptly communicated our decision to them, and subsequently began working with them. We have entered into a contract with them for their services from April 2017-April 2018, and we paid them \$10,000 as the first installment of their fee for the year-long consultation. Plans are in place for them to interview Council members in Princeton at our April meeting, and the AGO staff thereafter in NY. A strategic planning retreat is planned for the fall.

<u>Accounting and Finance</u>: The audit of the 2015-2016 year was completed and finalized by our auditors. We had a very solid year ending in the black in both operations and overall fiscal performance.

National Council is expected to receive the March 31, 2017 financials prior to the April meeting, putting us back on schedule with our monthly timetable.

Work has begun on drafting a 2017-2018 budget, but suggestions will also be brought forward to modify the 2016-2017 budget to bring it more in line with fiscal realities.

<u>Development and Communications</u>: Results of our fundraising efforts from September 1 through March 31 are provided within the agenda package. Tony Thurman reports that the major noticeable difference between last year and this year is that fact that we received the final Pogorzelski/Yankee funds last year. Stripping out that number to compare apples to apples, we are \$28,025 ahead this year of where we were at this time last year.

In other developments:

- A grant application to the National Endowment for the Arts was completed and submitted in February and March. Activities to be supported by the grant, if awarded, include Pipe Organ Encounters, the 2018 AGO National Convention, the professional certification program, online instructional videos, and the premier performances of new music commissions at the Kansas City convention.
- A letter and a new brochure supporting planned giving were mailed to approximately 6,000 Special members in March. This was an invitation to join the Clarence Dickinson Society. The F&D Committee will be making follow-up e-mails and phone calls to the most likely prospects.
- The 2017 AGO Gala honoring Joan Lippincott has garnered great support. More than \$32,000 has been raised for the Endowment Fund through March 31. Plans for the 2018 Gala honoring John Ferguson are underway. It will be held at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis on Friday, April 27, 2018, at 7 p.m. Plans are also underway for the 2019 Gala honoring John Walker. Although not yet confirmed, we expect the Gala will be hosted by Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh on April 26, 2019.

<u>Technology Updates for AGO Headquarters</u>: We continue to update our hardware and software environment to ensure that all staff are working with equipment and programs that are fully functional. We have purchased and installed new desktop computers and one laptop computer to replace aging equipment that prevented staff from working as efficiently as possible. Bill Valentine reports:

- 274 chapters participated in ONCARD for the 2016-2017 year.
- 36 issues of TAO are now available as online flip books and are password protected so that only current members of the AGO can read them.
- Our social media presence on Facebook, LinkedIn, and Twitter continues to grow. We currently have 7,845 Facebook Likes. A recent post, "8 things you need to know before dating an organist," reached a record 53,274 people. We have 2,239 Twitter followers and have sent 728 tweets. The AGO LinkedIn discussion group has 1,592 members and remains an active source of mentoring for organists.
- The AGO YouTube channel was recently updated with 30 videos in the Lessons for the New Organist playlist. Overall, the channel contains 74 videos, including 9 stylishly-produced videos from the 2015 Pittsburgh Mid-Atlantic Regional Convention.
- Our website is continually being updated with fresh content. We have 193 blog posts and 352 pages of content. Current blogs cover AGO and Organ News, Chapter News, and TAO Feature Articles. Dozens of AGO chapters that do not have the capacity to create their own website maintain a one-page website on agohq.org using a template we provide.
- We continue to work with our current AMS vendor, ISSI, to maintain and improve our membership database, IMPak, and ONCARD. This includes 30 hours of recent work to support recent changes in our dues structure. ISSI has been bought out by Impexium, and we had been expecting Impexium to release a chapter-management module in Q1 2017, but recently learned that there has been no progress on this front. There is no sunset date yet set for IMPak, but we may have to eventually consider changing AMS vendors.
- As part of an ongoing effort to improve and secure our technical environment the AGO national office underwent a security vulnerability assessment in November by Cino, Ltd., a company recommended by our auditors. We have invested in additional software to increase security for our local area network and the individual desktop computers used by Headquarters staff.

Membership:

- As of about 6pm EST on Friday, 3/31/17, the rate increases and dues category changes went into effect for new and reinstating AGO members.
- The membership brochure is in the final stages of being updated. A final revision should be ready to go to the printer by April 5th.

- Work continues to be done with ISSI to get our database ready for the start of July 1 renewals. Invoices will be mailed in mid-April.
- A strategy for implementing the FTC changes into the membership renewal process needs to be developed; ideally this should be done prior to the start of invoicing in mid-April.
- The 2016 Membership Directory was published and distributed to all buyers. We lost only a handful of sales due to the delay. The Directory will generate approximately \$15,000 of revenue. We expect to receive the check in the next two months.

<u>Education</u>: This section incorporates reports from Harold Calhoun, Manager of Educational Resources, and Eric Birk, who staffs the Committee on Pipe Organ Encounters.

The Committee on Continuing Professional Education finished the videotaping of 30 Lessons for the New Organist. The videos feature Fred Hohman, former CCPE Director, at the organ presenting 30 brief lessons on a wide variety of subjects that beginning organists will find of interest. Mark Crabtree (Treetop Productions) was the videographer. The videos can now be accessed in the New Organist Pages under the Education tab on the AGO website.

The Committee on Continuing Professional Education awarded two new Pogorzelski-Yankee scholarships in March, 2017. Kateri Andress of Colgate, Wisconsin received the award for the freshman entering college, and Isaac Drewes of Northfield, Minnesota received the award for the first year graduate. Six college freshman and seven first year graduate applications were received.

The Committee on Professional Certification has revised the Study Guide for AGO Colleague Certification. The new study guide is now available from AGO HQ (\$20).

We have continued advertising and supporting the 2017 National AGO Pedagogy Conference which will be held at KU, October 18-21.

POEs continue to accept applicants and are reaching the halfway point of capacity. The San Diego POE has already reached full capacity with 26 participants. Additional applications are being accepted for a waiting list only.

Seven people have signed up for the POE Tech program in Atlanta.

Five site proposals have been received for 2018, with 3-4 more expected to arrive late. Three chapters have expressed interest in hosting a POE+, so this may be the first time we have multiple opportunities for adults to take advantage of this summer institute in a single year.

<u>Conventions</u>: On March 6 I met in Seattle with Wyatt Smith and Sam Libra, the cochairs of the 2022 Seattle Convention, Norma Amodt-Nelson, the Seattle Chapter Dean, and Andy Anastasi of Conference Direct to conduct site visits of possible headquarters sites for that convention.

On March 26-28 I attended a productive meeting of the Committee for Conventions in Houston during which we continued work on updating the AGO's National Convention Guidelines.

Eric Birk, who has provided substantial support to those in charge of AGO Conventions, reports:

Our five 2017 regional conventions using Cvent are all up and running, and as of April 7, we have a total of 714 registrants in those five events (Jacksonville, Richmond, Youngstown, Iowa City, and Dallas). A mobile app was approved in early March for download in Android and Apple online stores. Jacksonville has completed the set-up for their event which had to be live for the app to be approved. Some minor adjustments and content uploads still need to be completed by the convention. The mobile app for Jacksonville can be viewed online here: https://event.crowdcompass.com/jackson.

The chapters hosting regional conventions in 2019 will soon be learning the steps for preparedness to use Cvent for Registration and the accompanying CrowdCompass platform for the mobile app. Invoices to each of the regionals using Cvent in 2017 are going out to them shortly.

The revised Regional Convention Guidelines are complete, and I am making final edits to the text already posted on the AGO website. Two sample documents are also scheduled to go up soon: the regional convention budget template and advertiser forms prepared by TAO Advertising Manager Maury Castro. These forms include letters of agreement and ad orders to enable regional conventions to have easy-to-use customizable documents for selling advertising in their program books, websites, and mobile apps.

<u>Competitions</u>: Harold Calhoun has provided this synopsis of recent activity in the area of competitions.

The 2018 NYACOP rules were published in the March issue of TAO.

The NCOI application round concluded in March. Skye Hart, Robert Horton, Doug Murray, Kalle Toivio, and Juan Andres Mesa are the five semifinalists who will compete at the NE regional convention this summer. Judging the application round were Sue Mitchell-Wallace, David Hurd, and Joel Martinson.

The 2nd Annual Pogorzelski - Yankee commission was premiered on March 26, 2017 at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. Christopher Adler was awarded the commission for his piece Construct: for organ, which was played by Ann Labounsky on the Pogorzelski-Yankee Memorial Organ.

The 2017 AGO/Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists will conclude on April 15th. Fifty-seven competitors are performing at 30 chapter hosted competitions.

This year, the AGOYO North Central Region organized a Young Composers Competition to encourage young composers and provide a venue for their new compositions. Two prize winners were announced in March: First Place (\$1,000) Aleksander Jan Szopa, Fantasia "Veni Sancte Spiritus" and Second Place (\$500) Christopher LaRosa "Falcon 9." These two compositions and three others that were

awarded honorable mentions will be premiered at the 2017 North Central Regional Convention by Wyatt Smith.


