

#### **PRESENTERS**



The Rev. John W. Neely will serve as Keynote Speaker and Hymn Festival Choir director. He has served as Associate Pastor for Music at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Dayton, Ohio, since 1981. John is a graduate of Duquesne University, Union Theological Seminary

School of Sacred Music, and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. He has taught in the music departments of Washington and Jefferson College, Washington, PA, and Mt. Union College, Alliance, OH. He has been Dean of the Canton and Dayton Chapters of the American Guild of Organists and was National President of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. He also serves as Music Director of the Bach Society of Dayton.



David Arcus, organ clinician for the conference, is Parish Musician of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Hillsborough, North Carolina, where he overseas adult and junior/youth choral programs and presides at an 1883 Hook & Hastings organ built for the early nineteenth century

church. He was at Duke University for nearly 30 years, where he served in various capacities in the Department of Music, Divinity School, and Duke Chapel. Dr. Arcus holds degrees from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and Yale University. He has received awards in composition and improvisation, and is in demand as a solo recitalist, having performed throughout the United States, Europe, and Great Britain. He has toured worldwide with the Duke Chapel Choir, has presented masterclasses on service playing and organ improvisation for the American Guild of Organists, and has served as Course Organist for RSCM (America) training courses. His CD, *The Organs of Duke Chapel*, is on the Gothic label.



Robin Arcus is the Producer and Director of the documentary film Sacred Sound. Hearing the girls sing at the week-long Carolina Course of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) and witnessing their spiritual development through liturgy

and music, Robin vowed to share the chorister experience through film as a way of inviting a broader audience into the world of faith through great sacred music. On the Feast of St. Francis in 2011, she met professional filmmaker Todd Tinkham (co-producer) outside Duke University Chapel while blessing animals. The result was Sacred Sound, filmed during the July 2013 RSCM Carolina Course. Music Director for that course was David Hill, Director of the BBC Singers and London Bach Choir; course accompanist was her husband David Arcus; and the final service was held in sonorous Duke Chapel.

Other presenters: Olivia Ahyoung, Jonathan Hehn, Larry Gerber, and panelists from the Tallahassee clergy community.



The Rev. Brant Copeland, panel moderator and Hymn Festival leader, has been pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Tallahassee since 1985. He holds degrees from Rhodes College, the University of St. Andrews, Scotland, the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, and Union Theological Seminary in

Virginia. Brant is a member of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians and a contributor to several publications, including Reformed Liturgy and Music and Feasting on the Word. He serves on several boards of directors locally, is active in state-wide social justice causes, and co-chairs the Tallahassee Interfaith Clergy. He and his wife Alexandra have two sons: Adam, who teaches at Luther Seminary in Minneapolis, and lan, who is a graduate student in ethnomusicology at Harvard.



**Dr. Charlotte Kroeker** will present the CMI eMusic Library and lead the choral reading session for the conference. She is executive director of the Church Music Institute, coming from the faculty of the University of Notre Dame. A performing pianist and church musician, she is the author of *Music in Christian Worship* (Liturgical

Press, 2005) and *The Sounds We Offer* (Alban Press, 2011), the latter a study of nine congregations where excellent music programs have contributed to vigorous growth and meaningful worship.



Michael Corzine, conference Hymn Festival organist, is Organist & Choirmaster of First Presbyterian Church, Tallahassee, and Professor Emeritus of Organ at the Florida State University College of Music. He holds degrees from the University of Wisconsin and the Eastman School of Music. At the College of Music,

Dr. Corzine taught courses in organ history and literature, service playing, organ design, and hymnology, in addition to his studio instruction. He has served on the faculty of the Montreat Conferences on Worship and Music as Service Organist (2002) and Assistant to the Conference Director (2006). To enhance his understanding of organbuilding, Corzine spent a semester on sabbatical from FSU to work in the shop of C. B. Fisk Organbuilders, Gloucester, MA, in 2007.
