



COMPOSERS

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JOHN BURGE

Dr. John Burge was born in Dryden, Ontario in 1961. While still in public school in Calgary, he received his Associate Diploma from the Royal Conservatory of Toronto in Piano Performance. He also holds degrees in Composition and Theory from the University of Toronto (B.Mus. and M.Mus.) and the University of British Columbia (D.M.A.). Since 1987 he has been teaching at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario where he currently holds the position of Full Professor and has served as Director of the School of Music. In recognition of his very successful career as a composer, John Burge was awarded a Queen's University Excellence in Research and Scholarship Prize in 2013. In 2014 he was inducted as a Fellow into the Royal Society of Canada.

John Burge has written a large body of vocal, chamber, and orchestral compositions. He is particularly well known for his choral music, which has been performed by such choirs as The Elmer Iseler Singers, The BBC Singers, The Amabile Youth Choir, The Toronto Children's Chorus and The St. Louis Symphony Children's Choir. Many of these choral works have been published by Boosey and Hawkes Music Publishers. His composition, Angels' Voices, for choir and orchestra, received the 2006 Outstanding New Choral Composition Award from the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors and was performed in New York City's Carnegie Hall in 2005. Burge also has a strong affinity in writing for string instruments, having composed over a dozen works for string orchestra. Flanders Fields Reflections is probably his most performed and broadcast work for strings. Commissioned by Sinfonia Toronto, this group's recording of the work on the Marquis Classics label received the 2009 Juno Award for the Best Canadian Classical Composition. Notable recent successes include his chamber opera, The Auction, with the libretto adapted from a well-loved children's story by Jan Andrews. The work received a highly successful premiere at the Westben Summer Music Festival in 2012.



GILLES MAURICE LECLERC

Born in Ottawa in 1960, **Gilles Maurice Leclerc** studied with Gerald Bales and Patricia Wright (organ), Steven Gellman (composition) and Agnes Grossman (choral conducting). The University of Ottawa presented him the 1984 Jean-Marie-Beaudet Scholarship for composition, and he was among the winners of the 1985 CAPAC National Competition for Young Composers. He premiered his Élan for piano live on Radio-Canada that same year. He holds a Masters in Musicology from the University of Ottawa.

His concert works have been performed in Canada, the United States and in Europe. In 2008, he presented a complete recital of his organ music at Westminster Cathedral, London, during the Annual Festival of New Organ Music. His chamber works have been broadcast on the CBC. His first CD, Gilles Maurice Leclerc: Œuvres pour orgue, volume 1 (2005) received commendable reviews from Scena Musicale (Montreal), Choir and Organ (London, UK), the Ottawa Citizen (Ottawa) and Organ Canada (R.C.C.O., Toronto). He has also composed extensively for the French Roman Catholic liturgy and his Messe de Saint-François d'Assise is sung in many parishes in Canada. He released the first of three volumes of psalms settings for the new French Sunday Lectionary in the fall of 2016.



GRAHAM GORDON RAMSAY

Graham Gordon Ramsay is in demand as a creator of instrumental and vocal works for venues throughout the Americas and Europe. Born in California in 1962, Ramsay studied music at the Tanglewood Institute, Boston University, and the Fontainebleau School in France. His composition teachers have included such masters as Robert Sirota, Joyce McKeel, Theodore Antoniou, David Del Tredici, Narcis Bonet, and Andrew Thomas.

Ramsay has received commissions from numerous solo performers and ensembles including the Burgett Ensemble, the Seraphim Singers, and American Classics. In recent years he has been commissioned to create liturgical works for the choirs of King's Chapel in Boston, St Stephen's Episcopal Church in Providence, Rhode Island, and St. Thomas More Church in New York City, among others.

He is the recipient of various grants and awards, including a Massachusetts Institute of Technology Council for the Arts grant and first prize in the 2003 Roger Wagner Contemporary Choral Composition Competition for his setting of Psalm 121 for chorus and solo violin.



MARK SIRETT

Conductor, composer, pianist and organist, **Mark Sirett** (b. 1952) is the founding Artistic Director of the award-winning Cantabile Choirs of Kingston, Ontario, Canada. He is a native of Kingston and holds both masters and doctoral degrees in choral conducting and pedagogy from the University of Iowa. Dr. Sirett has taught at the University of Alberta, the University of Western Ontario and Queen's University.

Dr. Sirett is an award-winning composer whose works are frequently performed by some of Canada's leading ensembles. Commissions have included works for the National Youth Choir of Canada, the Amabile Youth Singers, Ottawa Regional Youth Choir, Elora Festival Singers, University of Iowa and the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir. His published works are found in the catalogues of Boosey and Hawkes, Oxford University Press, ECS Publishing, Walton, Hinshaw, Alliance, Santa Barbara, Carus Verlag, Augsburg/Fortress, Alfred and Canadian International.



JULIAN WACHNER

As Director of Music at New York's historic Trinity Church Wall Street, **Julian Wachner** oversees an annual season of hundreds of events, with duties including conducting Trinity's flagship weekly series, Bach at One, which canvasses the entire choral-orchestral output of J. S. Bach, and leading Compline by Candlelight, Trinity's innovative and fully improvised variation on this ancient monastic ritual. He also curates the long standing and cherished Concerts at One series, presenting an eclectic program of weekly concerts for Lower Manhattan and beyond through its HD live and on-demand webcasting. Besides serving as Principal Conductor of Trinity's resident contemporary music orchestra NOVUS NY, The Trinity Baroque Orchestra, and The Choir of Trinity Wall Street, Wachner is also Music Director of the Grammy Award-winning Washington Chorus, with whom he won ASCAP's Alice Parker award for adventurous programming and Chorus America's Margaret Hilles Award for Choral Excellence.

Wachner has an extensive catalogue of original compositions that have been variously described as "jazzy, energetic, and ingenious" (Boston Globe), having "splendor, dignity, outstanding tone combinations, [and] sophisticated chromatic exploration..." (La Scena Musicale), and being "a compendium of surprises" (Washington Post). The New York Times has characterized his music as "bold and atmospheric," demonstrating "an imaginative flair for allusive text setting," and has praised him for "the silken complexities of his harmonies." The American Record Guide noted that "Wachner is both an unapologetic modernist and an open-minded eclectic – his music has something to say."

He has won top prizes at several major competitions, receiving First Prize and Audience Prize in the Miami International Organ Competition (2014), the Fort Wayne National Organ Competition (2016), the Albert Schweitzer National Organ Competition in Wethersfield, CT (2013), and the Quimby Regional Competition for Young Organists in Austin, TX (2013). Alcee was also selected as one of five finalists for the final round of the Taylor Organ Competition in Atlanta, GA (2015), and won the \$5,000 second prize. In addition to being a "Rising Star" performer at the AGO national convention in Boston, MA (2014), he also received a grant from Oberlin Conservatory to spend January 2014 in France studying historic organs and repertoire. Alcee returned to France in April 2016 and March 2017 to perform solo recitals as a part of the Festival Myrelingues in Lyon and continues to do international volunteer work as the parrain of a music immersion course in Lyon's district. He is regularly featured at various organ festivals, including the Atlanta International Organ Festival, and various AGO conventions.



He holds both a Bachelor of Music Degree in Music Education and Organ Performance, and the Master of Sacred Music Degree from Boston University.



JONATHAN OLDENGARM

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

Hans-Ola Ericsson studied composition and organ mainly in Stockholm and Freiburg but later also in the US and in Venice. He took the initiative to build the innovative Woehl organ at Studio Acusticum in Piteå (inaugurated 2012) and directed the project. He is currently professor and chair of organ and church music at McGill University in Montréal.

Vincent Boucher is enjoying a true double career, pursuing both music and finance. He has studied under harpsichordist Luc Beauséjour and organist Bernard Lagacé. While in Mireille Lagacé's class at the Conservatoire de musique de Montréal, a jury twice unanimously awarded him a first prize for organ and harpsichord. He has also completed a doctorate in performance at McGill University with John Grew and William Porter, and furthered his studies in Vienna with Michael Gailit, and later in Paris with Pierre Pincemaille.

In January 2015, Vincent Boucher was appointed titular organist at Saint-Joseph's Oratory. He has performed extensively and internationally, notably in England, France and Austria. In 2000 he won first prize in the John Robb Organ Competition. In 2002, he won the Académie de musique du Québec's Prix d'Europe, which had not been given to an organist since 1966. In 2003 he was awarded an Opus Prize in the category Discovery of the Year. He has already made fifteen recordings, which have won a number of prizes and the praise of critics.

For over 17 years, Vincent Boucher has worked in the financial industry. He holds a bachelor's degree in finance and a graduate degree in e-commerce from the HEC, Université de Montréal's business school, a Master of Business Administration from Oxford University and the prestigious Chartered Financial Analyst designation.

Cherry Rhodes is the first American to win an international organ competition (Munich). During her brilliant career, she has toured extensively throughout the major music capitals of America and Europe with recitals in cathedrals, churches, and concert halls—including Lincoln Center (New York City), Kennedy Center (Washington, D.C.), Orchestra Hall (Chicago), Meyerson Symphony Center (Dallas), the Performing Arts Center (Milwaukee), the Academy of Music and Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts (Philadelphia), Royal Festival Hall (London), International Performing Arts Center (Moscow), Philharmonic Halls of Berlin, Dortmund, and Luxembourg, the Organ and Architecture Symposium, and the renowned International September Music Festival of Montreux-Vevey (Switzerland). Other international festivals include those of Paris (Notre-Dame and St. Eustache), Munich, Freiburg, Nuremberg, St. Albans, Luxembourg, Vienna, Bratislava, Prešov, Gdańsk, and Warsaw. She has performed during seven American Guild of Organists national conventions and numerous AGO regional conventions. Many of her performances have been broadcast throughout North America and Europe. She has performed as soloist with orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic (with conductors Simon Rattle and Edo de Waart), the Phoenix Symphony, the Pasadena Chamber Orchestra (conducted by Robert Duerr), the South German Radio Orchestra, and the Orchestra of the French National Radio.

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
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
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NICHOLAS CAPOZZOLI

Rohinton Moos (Ronnie) was born in 1935, in Bombay, to a father who was an MD Lond., physician and Superintendent of one of the largest teaching hospitals in the city. He vividly recalls his father taking him to see the devastation caused by the great Bombay Explosion 1944, where miles of the entire dockside were devastated, a great number of ships destroyed, and bars of gold came crashing down from the sky. His father died the following year when Ronnie was still a child, but left behind a great cache of shellac recordings. After early formative schooling in Bombay, his education continued at Dulwich College, London, and King's College, Cambridge (MA Natural Sciences). He then articled in the City of London towards a FCA (Eng.& Wales) as he felt an accounting degree would assist, in the late 1950's in earning a reasonable livelihood in the business world. During that 1950's decade, he experienced an unparalleled exposure, a veritable listening feast, of all the great song cycles, operas at Covent Garden, and symphonic and chamber concerts which only the great city of London could provide. He returned to India in 1961, began as accountant and was promoted to Secretary and CFO of a large British Subsidiary, where he served for eighteen years: controlling all purchasing, financial, legal matters. He emigrating to Canada in the fall of 1979, following his brother who came years earlier. Over the remaining fifteen years till retirement, he held positions in the finance area with Dupont and then the GOC.

NCOI SEMI-FINALS

• • • •

Last December 2016, nine organists submitted initial applications to the 2018 AGO National Competition in Organ Improvisation Competition. Shortly thereafter, performing in the presence of a proctor, each competitor created a live recording in January–early February that was uploaded into the online application software in accordance with the procedure outlined in the 2018 rules. A panel of three judges—David Hurd, Joel Martinson, and Sue Mitchell- Wallace—without any identifying information reviewed the recordings of each performer and selected the five semifinalists named here. The NCOI Committee expresses its thanks to the judges and to each of the competitors and their proctors.

In the 2018 competition, the NCOI committee continued to emphasize and promote the pedagogical aspects of the competition. This year, the performance requirements for the initial application round included a repertoire piece by either Muffat, Buxtehude, Sweelinck, or Pachelbel, a hymn to be improvised with a creative introduction and at least two contrasting harmonizations, five contrasting variations on the hymn "Erhalt uns, Herr," and a free improvisation on a provided theme.

The 2018 competition continues with a semifinal round to be held at the 2017 Northeast Regional Convention in Montreal, Quebec on July 5, 2017, at the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul. By showcasing the art of improvisation at a regional convention, the NCOI committee hopes to build interest throughout the Guild for this important art form. The final round will be limited to three competitors. It will be held in conjunction with the 2018 AGO National Convention in Kansas City, Mo., on July 3, 2018, at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.

Robert Horton is organist-choirmaster at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Lancaster, Pa. Prior to his appointment at Trinity, he served as interim chapel organist at Duke University. From 2005 to 2008, he served as director of keyboard studies at Dordt College where he taught organ, history, solfege, and directed the college jazz band. Dr. Horton holds degrees from Cornell, Northwestern, and the University of Kansas. As a Fulbright scholar, he studied at the CNR in Toulouse. Dr. Horton's playing has garnered numerous accolades, including highest honors at the 2007 Tariverdiev Competition.



JUAN MESA

A native of Chile, **Juan Mesa** holds degrees in organ performance from Western Connecticut State University and Indiana University. He studied organ performance with Stephen Roberts, Christopher Young, organ improvisation with Todd Wilson and Jeffrey Smith, and harpsichord and continuo with Elisabeth Wright. He was the 2003 Region I RCYO winner, and has appeared in recitals across the U.S., as well as in Chile and Argentina. Juan Andres is currently a PhD candidate (ABD) in the music theory program at Indiana University, and serves as director of music at St. Mary's Church in Holliston, Mass.



DOUGLAS MURRAY

Douglas Murray is a professor of English at Belmont University, Nashville, Tenn., author of articles on 18th-century fiction, and editor (with Margaret Anne Doody) of Austen's Catharine and Other Writings (Oxford World's Classics). He studied organ with Stanley Scheer at Pfeiffer University in his native North Carolina and attended improvisation workshops with William Porter, Jeffrey Brillhart, Gerre Hancock, Rick Erickson and Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra. He is organist at Second Presbyterian Church, Nashville. He participated in NCOI 2012 and 2014, in which he placed third and second.



KALLE TOIVIO

Kalle Toivio, organist and director of music at the Church of Notre Dame, New York City, won third prize at the 2016 NCOI in Houston. He has played organ recitals in such venues as the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York City and the Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. He is the founder and sub-dean of the Finland chapter. Mr. Toivio is on the organ faculty at the Manhattan School of Music Precollege Division, and studied with McNeil Robinson for more than seven years.

JEAN-BAPTISTE ROBIN





With his appointment in 2010 as Organist of the Royal Chapel at the Palace of Versailles, **Jean-Baptiste Robin** was secured a place in a long line of royal organists, such as Francois Couperin, Louis Marchand, Louis-Claude Daquin, and Claude Balbastre, as "court musician" of that world-renowned building. Widely regarded as one of the most prominent and accomplished French organists and composers of his generation, Jean-Baptiste Robin also serves as Professor of Organ at the Conservatoire a Rayonnement Regional in Versailles. From 2000-2010, he was Organist of Poitiers Cathedral, where he presided over the cathedral's famous Clicquot organ.

In addition to his well-known performances of classic and romantic French organ repertoire, he is also considered one of the great performers of the American Symphonic organ repertoire and is widely admired for his transcriptions and kaleidoscopic registrations, as evidenced in his CD The American Symphonic Organ recorded on the E.M. Skinner organ at the Cincinnati Museum Center's Union Terminal (Brilliant Classics label). His frequent performance trips to the United States have yielded recitals in nearly half of the fifty states, including those at Woolsey Hall at Yale University, the Cincinnati Museum Center's Union Terminal, the Cathedral of St. Paul in Minneapolis, MN, St. James Cathedral in Seattle, and the Cathedral of the Madeleine in Salt Lake City, among many others. He was a featured performer at the 2010 national convention of the American Guild of Organists held in Washington DC.

HONORARY AWARD RECIPIENTS



The festival showcases the organ in solo and ensemble situations, played brilliantly by passionate Canadian and international artists, established and emerging. Concerts and other events cover repertoire from classical through pops to contemporary and jazz. Master classes for organists are open to all.

ORGANIX CONCERTS

Over its twelve-year existence **Organix Concerts** has featured organists of international stature such as Dame Gillian Weir and Diane Bish, while local artists have included Lew Williams, William and Patricia Wright, Ryan Jackson, Sarah Svendsen, Rachel Mahon, Thomas Fitches and Mark Toews. Ensemble performances have included organ paired with trumpet, percussion, violin or choir, presented by musicians including Rachel Laurin, Andrew Streliaev, Elke Volker, Jacques Israelievitch, Michael Capon, Michael Barth, Richard Moore and the Senior Choir of St Michael's Choir School, Toronto.

Organix Concerts was the brainchild of Gordon Mansell and William O'Meara, who served as Co-Artistic Directors of the Festival. Following William's retirement, Gordon has carried the mantle on his own. The mission remains to bring the King of Instruments out of its religious exile and to make attendance at organ concerts as popular in Toronto as in many European cities.

FRCCO (HONORIS CAUSA)

JAMES BAILEY

 \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet

Prior to his term as National President (2014-2016), **James Bailey** was a dedicated member of the College, and made significant contributions to the Toronto Centre, serving as president from 2010-2012. Particularly noteworthy is his work on the book *Organs of Toronto*, published in 2002. James was the driving force behind this project, and spent countless hours reviewing research, drafting and editing the text, and producing an elegant and timeless volume, which stands as a public record of the fine musical craftsmanship that exists in Toronto, and also a useful resource for producers and impresarios.

During James's presidency closer relations have been forged between the RCCO and the American Guild of Organists, the Canadian International Organ Competition, the Royal College of Organists, the Fédération québecois des amis de l'orgue, and the American Institute of Organbuilders. These resulted in some joint-membership opportunities for our members, and a better awareness of our activities among our peer organizations. For example, the decision to increase the prize value of the RCCO prize at the CIOC from \$2000 to \$5000 enticed every competitor to program one or more Canadian works. It also inspired the

Sir Ernest MacMillan Foundation to present a new award in 2017 for the best performance of a Canadian composition by a Canadian competitor

in the semi-final and/or final round. James actively participated in the planning committee for the Montreal Organ Festival 2017, a joint event with the RCCO and the AGO Northeast Region.

James's tenure as National President witnessed a major overhaul of the National Website, along with an exhaustive logo and corporate identity reflection process. He also enhanced the functioning of both the Board and the National Council, and oversaw the planning for a reorganization of the National Office. Like many other membership-based organizations, the RCCO faces challenges in the coming years, but it is now better equipped to meet and overcome them, thanks in no small part to the leadership of James Bailey.

Since finishing his term as National President, James has become more active in the Montreal Organ Festival Committee, and has recently joined the Board of Directors of the CIOC. He will speak at a symposium in Halifax in May 2017, on the future of the organ and increasing public awareness for the pipe organ and its vast repertoire, and is involved in projects related to the eventual restoration of the organ at St. James Cathedral in Toronto.

JERZY CICHOCKI

Jerzy Cichocki is Music Director of the Victoria Scholars and for 27 years was Artistic Director of St. Michael's Choir School in Toronto and Conductor of the Senior Choirs of St. Michael's Cathedral. He studied at the University of Toronto and at Yale University, where he received the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Conducting in 1991.

Through his work at St. Michael's Choir School and Cathedral Basilica Jerzy Cichocki shaped the careers of many of his students, and was an exemplary teacher of sacred choral music. Within the RCCO, he has served as an examiner for the Choral Conducting Diploma of the College and holds the ARCCO diploma. He has served as editor for Gordon V. Thompson editions, Toronto, and of the new hymnbook With Angels and Archangels (2016), a labour of love taken up voluntarily.

Dr. Cichocki is in frequent demand as a clinician, and has presented workshops across the country for different musical organizations. Recent guest-conducting engagements have included the Elora Festival Singers, the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony, the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir and the Toronto Philharmonic. Dr. Cichocki's unwavering dedication to the advancement of sacred music through his own practice, teaching, and scholarship has rightly earned him an international reputation.

GILLES LECLERC

Born in Ottawa, **Gilles Leclerc** has been a member of the RCCO for more than thirty years. He was chair of the Ottawa Centre's professional concerns committee, Centre President from 1998 to 2001, Coordinator of the 2003 National Convention in Ottawa, and Program Convener of the 2013 National Convention. He represented the Ottawa Centre on National Council before becoming national Vice-President and chair of the Endowment Committee in 2006. He was National President of the College - our first Francophone president - from 2010 to 2012. He has also served on both Centre and National Historical Organs committees, and assists with planning and translations for the Pro Organo Ottawa recital series.

Gilles Leclerc studied organ with Gerald Bales and Patricia Wright, choral conducting with Agnes Grossman, and composition with Steven Gellman at the University of Ottawa, where he completed a Master's Degree in Musicology with a thesis that was the first-ever study of the music of organist and composer Alexis Contant (1858-1918).

Gilles Leclerc is also well-known as a composer, having written for solo piano and organ, for choirs and for string quartet, and extensively for the French Roman Catholic liturgy. He has contributed articles to the Encyclopedia of Music in Canada and to various organ and liturgy periodicals in Canada and the U.S. He has been on staff at Library and Archives Canada since 2001.

THOMAS MURRAY

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Thomas Murray, concert organist and recording artist, is University Organist and Professor of Music at Yale University, where he has served on the faculty for 34 years and has taught many of the leading performers of today, including Canadian organists Ken Cowan, Ryan Jackson, Stephen Boda, Sarah Svendsen, David Simon, Brennan Szafron, Kola Owolabi, Peter Nikiforuk, Andrew Henderson, Glen Segger and Stephen Fraser.

Widely known for his interpretations of Romantic repertoire and orchestral transcriptions, his recordings are highly acclaimed. High Fidelity has credited him with "... consummate skill and artistry in treating the organ as a great orchestra" and American Record Guide said of his Elgar CD: "Murray's performance and his handling of the immense resources of the Woolsey Hall organ are beyond superlatives ... the shape of every phrase, the use of every colour ... could not be more perfect."

Born in California in 1943, Murray studied with Clarence Mader at Occidental College. He has appeared in recitals and lectures at six national conventions of the AGO, which named him International Artist of the Year for 1986. As the recipient of this award he followed such luminaries as Marie-Claire Alain, Jean Guillou and Dame Gillian Weir. In 2003 he was named an honorary fellow of the Royal College of Organists, and in 2005 he was awarded the Gustave Stoeckel Award for excellence in teaching from the Yale University School of Music.

He has appeared in recital in Canada (including several concerts at Metropolitan United Church in Toronto), England, Japan, South America and Australia, as well as throughout continental Europe. Notable performances included recitals for the International Congress of Organists in Cambridge (1987) and the Lahti Organ Festival in Finland, where he was soloist with the Moscow Chamber Orchestra, conducted by Constantin Orbelian. He has performed with the Pittsburgh, Milwaukee, Houston and New Haven Symphony Orchestras, as well as the National Chamber Orchestra in Washington DC, the Yale Philharmonia and Yale Symphony Orchestra.

Thomas Murray is currently Principal Organist and Artist in Residence at Christ Church, Episcopal, in New Haven, one of the notable Anglo-Catholic churches of North America.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

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FREDERICK FRANCIS

Frederick Francis has been a member of the Montreal Centre of the RCCO since the mid 1970's, serving actively in portfolios since the late 1980's. He was Centre Chair from 1988 to 1991, Vice-President for Membership and External Affairs from 2005 to 2011 and Centre Co-Chair 2010 to 2011.

Fred has personified the mandate of the Montreal Centre in working tirelessly behind the scenes in many ways. He accepted without hesitation the position of Registrar of the Montreal Organ Festival 2017. Following the resignation of the previous regional director, Fred accepted the position of director for Region 2; and when the Montreal Centre President had to step down for personal reasons, Fred took on the position as co-president with the Vice-President. Following his passion for vision and strategic planning, he has led the centre in developing surveys, information sessions, and supporting colleagues who think "outside the box." He has facilitated volunteer recruitment for the Canadian International Organ Competition. He has been a benefactor of the Montreal Centre with emphasis on student membership sponsorship. Fred is esteemed for other ways of upholding colleagues as well: whether by reminding lapsed members of the importance of renewing membership in the centre; attending a final service or funeral, or acting as advisor to those in difficulty, substituting at downtown parishes after finding a substitute for his own position, and finally, often hosting centre executive meetings at his home.

He has promoted the RCCO brand through collaboration and support of various choral activities (Hymn Sings, Black History Month Evensongs), encouraging local parishes to work together and involving non-RCCO members to help break their isolation.

To the membership at large, Fred is considered the heart and soul of the Montreal Centre, spurring others on with his eternal optimism sprinkled with grace and humility.

JACK HILLIER

Jack Hillier was born in Newfoundland. At a very early age be began to play the organ in his father's church in Grand Falls. He attended Memorial University in St. John's where he played the organ and directed the choir at Gower St. United Church.

In 1947 Jack left Newfoundland and took up residence in Toronto. He studied with Drummond Wolff and gained his ARCT with him in organ. He also graduated from the University of Toronto with a Bachelor of Music. Upon graduation he launched his church music career, directing choirs, teaching organ and piano students and doing some recital work. He served at Perth Ave. United Church and for fifteen years

was at North Broadview United Church where he restored and built up an excellent church choir. He also served at St. Luke's and Humbervale United Churches, each for fifteen year terms.

During these years in Toronto, he became General Secretary of the RCCO in the National Offices. In addition he served as Treasurer of the College and Examinations Registrar. Jack was instrumental in the creation of the Simcoe-Muskoka Centre which is still thriving today. Within the Stratford Centre, Jack enthusiastically supports all events. The centre honoured him in November 2016 by presenting him with a commissioned work by Dr. John Vandertuin.

As a composer, Jack has written a cantata on "The Seven Last Words of Christ", as well as four hymns, twenty five descants, and a Christmas carol.

At age 92, Jack still plays the organ every Sunday on his three-manual original Casavant at the local Baptist church. In his career of playing the organ for some eighty years he has touched many lives with his uncompromising high standard of playing.

HOWARD JANZEN

Howard Janzen was born in Didsbury, Alberta in 1950. He earned the B.Mus. degree in piano performance at the University of Calgary, and the M.Mus. degree in music theory from the University of Alberta. Further studies followed at Indiana University and the Banff School of Fine Arts. He is a fellow of the Royal Canadian College of Organists, and was a member of the executive of the Calgary Society of Organists for many years. He is also a gifted composer and lyricist.

Howard has taught at Medicine Hat College and Mount Royal College and has also accompanied at several ballet schools including Alberta Ballet and Ballet Arts Centre. He was part of the Calgary Boys Choir family throughout the 1990s. He was organist and music director in several Calgary churches, including St Stephen Anglican, Christ the King Anglican, and St John the Evangelist Roman Catholic. As a church organist, he would regularly arrange a demonstration of the organ for all ages, teaching how the organ functioned and encouraging people to explore the stops themselves, always promoting the love of music and the organ in particular. Each week, little children of the parish would flock around the organ at the conclusion of his postlude so they could push in the stops on the organ for him, crawl underneath it to turn off the light and finally shut the organ down.

Alane Boudreau recalls: "It was at St. John the Evangelist that I had the pleasure of working with Howard; I was brought in as the Director of the Choir, and Howard was our organist. In the three delightful years that we worked together, he constantly amazed me with the depth of his knowledge and his wide repertoire. A profoundly humble man, he would make quiet observations and historical comments about the different composers we were studying or pieces we were developing, often giving spontaneous musical examples of comparisons or periods that we were discussing. His offertory and communion improvisations, which he would dismissively refer to as "ditty in G" or "ditty in A minor" were delightful, and his vast treasury of preludes and postludes always managed to capture the spirit of the liturgical day and season. He successfully championed the cause of having the Casavant organ (Op 492) of St John the Evangelist designated as an historical organ."

CHRISTIAN LANE

Winner of the 2011 Canadian International Organ Competition and director of Boston Organ Studio, Christian Lane is one of America's most accomplished, respected and dynamic concert organists and pedagogues. Noted for his "gratifying musical maturity, demonstrated through playing that is suave, elegant, and exciting (The American Organist)," he is a frequent recitalist throughout North America and Great Britain; recent appearances include cathedrals and symphony halls on both sides of the Atlantic. As founding director of Boston Organ Studio, Mr. Lane cultivates the largest private organ studio in the United States, offering opportunity for focused, distinctive performance instruction without the commitment and cost of an academic degree program—a program unique in America.

JEAN-WILLY KUNZ

Jean-Willy Kunz is the first organist in residence of the Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal. In addition to playing both with the orchestra and in recital, he sees to the development and showcasing of the OSM's Grand Orgue Pierre-Béique. Jean-Willy Kunz studied with Louis Robilliard and Mireille Lagacé, as well as at McGill University, where he earned a doctorate with John Grew. He has been a prize-winner at a number of organ competitions, including the Canadian International Organ Competition, where in 2011 he won third prize and the Richard-Bradshaw Audience Prize. His discography includes many recordings which reflect the broad range of his musical influences. In September 2015, Jean-Willy Kunz was appointed organ professor at the Conservatoire de musique de Montréal.

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

A song of tears, a song of praise, A song to catch the holy taste, Of worlds collapsing into Hallelujah

Our morning worship today, in Montreal's stunning Marie Reine du Monde Cathedral, was shaped by an organist and church musician, Scott Bradford, a pastor and choral singer, the Rev'd Gwenda Wells, and a local composer, Tim Brady, whose own instrument is the electric guitar. Our goal was to let the music define an overall shape that would be somewhat familiar, in its use of opening invocation, readings from both Testaments, a psalm, intercessions, the Lord's Prayer, a moment of praise and a blessing, but to be very bold and varied in the choice of music, which we felt must reflect the contemporary spiritual yearning for the creative and the holy in a broken world. We wanted to highlight in both words and music the prayers and praises of musicians who seek to create meaning and hope; this was a priority for the intercessory prayer, with music based on one of the most beloved songs of the great Quebec chansonnier Félix Leclerc. The familiar Hallelujah by Leonard Cohen is here set to new lyrics which seek to follow the poetic spirit of Cohen in an idiom suitable for public worship. (Youth musicians love doing this one!) We wanted to give each one of us expressive space as we worked together. What is the place of music in worship - soothing and uplifting all who struggle with the human condition, celebrating the global Church, mentoring children and youth and encouraging the participation of all? Music in liturgy is seminal. It is not incidental. You will hear this vividly in a reading from a letter of Hildegard of Bingen, one wise old lady standing up to the powers that be in defence of the right to praise God in music. The four commissioned choral pieces by Brady, set to old Celtic prayer texts, frame the whole service with words charged with praise, thanksgiving for music and the natural world in which we have our being. Three Montreal composers, a tour of four continents, the interjection of the electric guitar into worship - like the organ, an instrument allowing bold explorations of sound, yet ready to accompa

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








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OLIVIER LATRY





French organist **Olivier Latry** is one of the most distinguished concert organists in the world today. One of three titular organists at the Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, he is also Professor of Organ at the Paris Conservatory of Music, Organist Emeritus with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra in Canada, and maintains a full schedule of concert performances appearing regularly as a soloist at prestigious venues and festivals, and with leading orchestras around the world.

Mr. Latry was born in Boulogne-sur-Mer, France, in 1962 where he began his musical studies. He later attended the Academy of Music at St. Maur-des-Fossés, studying organ with Gaston Litaize. From 1981 to 1985 he was titular organist of Meaux Cathedral, and at the age of 23 won the competition to become one of the three titular organists of the Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris along with Philippe Lefebvre and Jean-Pierre Leguay; the three of them succeeding Pierre Cochereau. In 1990 he succeeded his teacher, Gaston Litaize, as organ professor at the Academy of Music at St. Maur-des-Fossés, and then subsequently in 1995 was appointed Professor of Organ at the Paris Conservatory where he continues to teach today along with his distinguished colleague, Michel Bouvard.

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MARC-ANDRÉ DORAN

Born in 1961. Marc-André Doran received most of his musical training at the Conservatoire de musique du Québec in Montréal, where he studied from 1976 to 1986 under Bernard Lagacé. From 1986 to 1989, he continued advanced organ studies in France with Jean Boyer and Marie-Claire Alain. Upon his return from Europe, he completed his doctorate at the Université de Montréal with Réjean Poirier. Marc André Doran has performed in Canada and Europe, notably at Notre-Dame in Paris. Since 1980 Marc-André Doran has been organist at the historic church of La Visitation in Montréal's northend. Here he has worked closely with organ builder Hellmuth Wolff on the reconstruction of the organ, rebuilt from the remains of one of Canada's oldest instruments. Dr. Doran has recorded for ATMA and Fonovox labels. He currently works as a producer on the French FM network Espace musique of CBC.



JAN KRAYBILL

Jan Kraybill is a musical leader and dynamic speaker; a concert organist, pianist, and harpsichordist; an educator and organ consultant; and an enthusiastic cheerleader for the power of music to change lives for the better.

Dr. Kraybill is Executive Director of The Hymn Society in the United States and Canada, a non-profit organization whose mission is to encourage, promote, and enliven congregational singing.
