## **AGO Achievement Award – Requirements**

To be completed at the organ console. If a demonstration is called for but items are not present on your console, a good description will do:

- 1. Draw a principal chorus on the Great. Add an appropriate and balanced pedal registration and explain your choices to your mentor.
- 2. Draw a combination suitable for a trio. Explain your choices.
- 3. Draw a combination for two manuals and pedal for a solo voice with accompaniment, and an appropriately-balanced pedal. Explain your choices.
- 4. Tell your mentor what a céleste is, and point one out. Explain what a céleste is used for, and why it is <u>not</u> usually considered appropriate for registering organ compositions by Bach or for hymn playing.
- 5. Explain the meaning and uses of the following: Swell to Great 8', Swell to Great 4', Great Unison Off, Choir to Pedal.
- 6. Show your mentor an example of a mutation stop and a mixture stop. Explain why a mixture has a Roman numeral.
- 7. Explain what 16', 8', and 4' mean.
- 8. Demonstrate an effective registration for a joyful hymn, and then for a hymn of a penitential, meditative, or subdued character. Explain your choices.
