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Spring Reset

One of my favorite things about spring is waking up to birdsongs. The songbird choir seems to increase in joyfulness and number with the dawn of spring. These sights and sounds make my heart smile, filling me with overwhelming awe and gratitude for God the Artist and Creator.

This text, "as though the whole creation cried: Alleluia!", is from the first verse of a favorite hymn, "When in Our Music God Is Glorified", and follows the phrase, "When adoration leaves no room for pride. The two phrases are connected, with an implied cause and effect. This phrase about adoration caught my attention in a new way as I remembered it. Why is it so elusive for us, as worship leaders and musicians, to have such sole adoration, with only thoughts of our Creator, while worshipping on Sunday mornings?

"When adoration leaves no room for pride" is a description of a state of purpose, authenticity, and freedom in worship which can be difficult to access in today's worship services with its camera closeups and live stream production designed to inspire our congregations, yet accompanied with the pressure to create the bigger and better with diminishing numbers of volunteers. Complete unencumbered adoration of God, with no distraction by thoughts of ourselves or others, pride or perfection, as we offer music to an audience of One, sounds so freeing!

We have now completed Holy Week and Easter music, and are within reach of slowing down rehearsal schedules at the end of spring. May we dedicate ourselves to time for resetting this spring, by practicing naming and verbalizing reasons for adoration, and developing a concentrated focus on the One we adore. May we discover newfound adoration through our music, leading us to the truth stated in the second verse: "How often, making music, we have found a new dimension in the world of sound, as worship moved us to a more profound Alleluia!"


