Composer of the Month

Elizabeth Stirling

Elizabeth Stirling (1819-1895) was born in London and educated at home. She privately studied organ, piano, and harmony at the Royal Academy of Music. Her organ teacher, Edward Holmes, was a renowned German composer and a strong professional ally. At 16, Stirling became a respected recitalist, church organist, and composer, showcasing her dazzling pedal technique. She is believed to have been the first person to have performed J.S. Bach's 'St. Anne' Prelude and Fugue at a public recital in Britain. In 1856, she



applied for a music degree at Oxford University by submitting a piece. Though this composition was accepted, it was not performed, since at the time women were not eligible for degrees. Despite this, she went on to serve in church positions for decades.

Her set of voluntaries, Six Pedal Fugues and Eight Other Movements, was published



by Novello in 1857. In 1863, she married singer Frederick Albert Bridge, collaborating with him in concerts. Elizabeth composed two grand voluntaries, six pedal fugues, eight slow movements, and other organ works, over fifty songs and duets, and numerous arrangements of works of Bach, Mozart, and Handel. 
6 PEDAL FUGUES AND 8 OTHER MOVEMENTS

ELIZABETH STIRLING AND THE MUSICAL LIFE OF FEMALE ORGANISTS IN NINETEENTH-CENTURY ENGLAND

The Oxford Book of Organ Music by Women Composers

This new volume of 42 pieces was published in November and written by two of our colleagues from SWO, Anne Marsden Thomas and Ghislaine Reece-Trapp. The collection features original music for the instrument, spanning the sixteenth century to the present day, including compositions by Amy Beach, Clementine de Bourges, Nadia Boulanger, Jeanne Demessieux, Cecilia McDowall, Clara Schumann, and Ethyl Smyth, plus commissions from Kristina Arakelyan, Miriam Carpinetti, Ghislaine Reece-Trapp, Isabelle Ryder, Amy Summers, and Rebecca Groom te Velde. Standalone miniatures, movements from organ sonatas and symphonies, transcriptions of piano, harpsichord, and flute pieces, and an orchestral opera overture. It includes a variety of difficulty levels, from ABRSM Grades 2-3 through to Diploma standard, with a graded index provided.
