Remembering Alice Parker

Alice Parker, a choral composer, conductor, and teacher who celebrated beauty and unity, died at 98. She created more than 500 choral arrangements, hymns and other pieces and was one of the most widely performed contemporary composers. Born in 1925, she began composing early, and wrote her first orchestral score while still in high school. She graduated from Smith College with a major in music performance and composition, then receiving her master's degree from the Juilliard School, where she studied choral conducting with Robert Shaw.



Her life-work was choral and vocal music, combining composing, conducting and teaching in a creative balance. Her arrangements with Robert Shaw of folk songs, hymns and spirituals form an enduring repertoire for choruses all around the world. She composed in many forms, from operas to cantatas, sacred anthems to secular dances, song cycles to string quartets. In 1985, she founded Melodious Accord, Inc., a non-profit group which presents choral concerts, sponsors



workshops, symposia, and her many professional appearances. She made thirteen acclaimed recordings and published books on melodic styles, choral improvisation and 'Good Singing in Church'. In 2010, as a part of the Melodious Accord 25th Anniversary celebration, The Alice Parker Melodious Accord Hymnal was introduced. Five videos have appeared, showing her work with hymns and folk songs. She was recognized by Chorus America, the American Guild of Organists, the American Choral Directors Association, The Hymn Society and Choral Arts New England for her lifetime contributions to choral music. She was the recipient of six honorary doctorates and the Smith College Medal.

ALICE PARKER MUSIC

Composer of the Month

Roberta Bitgood

Roberta Bitgood (1908–2007) was born in New London, Connecticut. Her interest in music was evident from an early age, and she began studying violin at age 5. At 12, she was enrolled at the Williams Memorial Institute, a private secondary school for girls in New London, where she served as concertmaster and assistant conductor for her school orchestra. She frequently performed, too, as a violin soloist at local church and civic events. By 15, she was having organ lessons at her church and began working there as the assistant organist, eventually leading the junior choir. She went on to attend Connecticut College for Women, studying mathematics and music theory with a focus on both violin and organ performance.





She continued organ study after graduation in 1928, having won a scholarship to attend the Guilmant Organ School in New York City, where she became a student of William C. Carl and served as his assistant at First Presbyterian Church. While working with Dr. Carl, she completed the AGO Associate and Fellowship exams, scoring the highest mark in the country that year on the latter. She graduated

with the Guilmant School's top honor (a Tiffany-designed gold medal) before pursuing a master's degree in music education (Columbia Teachers College) and both a master's and finally a doctoral degree in sacred music (Union Theological Seminary). In 1945, Bitgood was the first woman and twelfth individual in the United States to receive a doctorate in sacred music.
